PLANT AT BURNS BOUGHT BY HODGES

The plant acquired has a total wire length of ten miles, and the new owners plan to extend it, and will move the old plant, which is two miles out of town to the city, and run it by steam. The new firm will take the plant over in a little over a month from this date, and hope to become permanent residents of the inland sage-brush city, which has about 1500 population, and is situated in the center of fine stock country.

ADORNs TIRE CO. BUILDING

Rodgers, whose husband operates the Tillamook Tire company at the corner of Second avenue and Ninth street, recently embellished the front of the adjoining Economy garage with a painting of Mt. Hood from Lost Lake, the picture being in oil colors on a space of eight by ten feet. On one side is a panel or door, the knob of which appears to be painting. It is on the main street travelled by tourists, and is usually attractive.

Mrs. Rodgers, who has painted for the past 25 years, was three days executing the painting from the time she started. She was a student of Paul De Longpre of California, and has since deceased, of Portland, and the son of Legall of Philadelphia. An artist in the east painted Paul Remondone, and Putman's Leap both subjects of the Revolutionary period, and won fame. Both pictures are said to be valuable.
