Schools

"Visit the schools" is the slogan adopted by The American Legion and National Education association for the week of November 18-24th, set

aside this year as American Education Week; for the purpose of extending a cordial and urgent invitation to the public to gain first hand knowledge of the workings of the schools thru personal observation of as much of the regular school work as possible and meetings and consultations with superintendents and teachers. Every where a sincere attempt is being made by the legion and educators to stir up interest in the foundation of American ideals, the public school. Oregon American Legion posts will combine their forces with the Educational association in observance of the week.

This is the goal for which the American Legion in Oregon will strive in an intensive membership campaign to start on Armistice Day, November 11th. Teams are being formed in each of the 114 posts of the legion in the state ready to jump off at the zero hour. First attention will be given to renewing 1923 memberships, and then the new members will be sought.

Lack of a co-operative and consistent drive for members in 1923 resulted in an enrollment of only 7,000 so far for the past year, but legion leaders are confident that they can raise this number to better than 10,000 before 1924 is well under way. The American Legion is one great veterans association to which all honorably discharged veterans of the World War are eligible.

Fred E. Kiddle, of Island City, Department Commander of the Legion elected at Seaside last September, has placed membership at the head of his aims for 1924 and is bending every effort to line up the local posts in this campaign.

WILL SHORTEN ROUTE

(Continued from page 1)

veyed, with an eye to shortening up distance, and eliminating heavy grades and bad turns, then the courts of the two counties will meet in joint session and decide which route is the shortest and most feasible, and which will be the cheapest from the standpoint of construction. It is believed that macadam road will be favored on account of its durability, smaller cost of maintenance, and the greater saving that can be made over the more expensive surfacing.

From information now at hand it is believed that the distance by both routes will be practically the same, although a survey of the proposed Cherry Grove-Trask river route, might prove to be even shorter than the Wilson route. By the present unused Wilson river route, the distance from Tillamook to Forest Grove is about 51 miles. Add 26 miles from Forest Grove to Portland, and we have the entire distance from Tillamook to Portland as 77 miles, the shortest route from Portland to the coast. The distance from Tillamook to Portland by rail is 120.9. Other routes run up as high as 112 miles. The saving in distance over the rail route to Portland by the Wilson route would be 43 miles, and by the present used route via McMinnville the saving in miles would be at least 35

miles; something worthy of consideration.

In case either of the two talked of routes should be made a highway for general travel, Tillamook and its beaches would stand in an enviable position as the shortest point from Portland on the coast. Moreover, it does not require great business prescience to be able to see the benefits that naturally would inure to Tillamook county by having the shortest route to the metropolis of the state. Naturally, all tourists who come to Portland, would choose the shortest route to the coast; and should they desire to travel the Roosevelt highway southward, Tillamook would be the nearest point of contact with the above highway. The importance of a short route from Washington county towns would assist farmers of that section to market hay, fruit and other farm commodities here by the use of trucks, and open up a new market, and at the same time save a matter of from 35 to 43 miles over other routes.

The county courts of Washington and Yamhill are working in accord in the matter of getting a shorter road to the coast. Both counties realize the value of such a road, and Portland should also take an interest, and doubtless would, were it shown the importance of the matter which the two counties now have under serious consideration.
