ce 1555 cases. Production now is considerable above last year due to the fine fall and the fact that the farmers feed heavily for milk production. The Tillamook creamery is still getting about 15,000 lbs. of milk per day and the other factories in proportion, although several of the smaller ones have commenced to make cheese every other day.

The association is now selling alfalfa hay at \$22.50 for the best grade. Feed prices remain practically unchanged. Molasses is being sold at \$30 the ton or \$9 for a 600 lb. barrel. The association now has its fine new warehouse completed and this is a fine addition to the buildings along the water front. All are invited to inspect the new building. It is not thought that feed prices will advance, in fact, the corn prices will decline considerable as soon as the new crop can be received.
