\$60,000 SENT AWAY YEARLY

It is estimated that fully \$60,000 goes out of Tillamook county annually that local merchants do not have a chance to see or to compete with in the matter of prices. This amount is sent to mail order houses, and on many occasions there is only a few cents difference in the cost of the articles from the mail order houses and the same article handled by local dealers.

Often times the mail order houses advertise stuff at a cheaper price than can be furnished by the local merchants of the county, but when one comes to compare the two articles it is found in almost every case that the local merchant has a better article, which it is good judgement to buy. The home dealer stands behind his sales, and you are where you can exchange it, and have any error corrected. The local business man helps to pay the taxes of the county, and the dealer in New York or elsewhere does not. The money leaves the county never to return. If spent at home it circulates in your community. Does it pay?
