

HABERLACHS' TRIP FULL OF INTEREST

Carl Haberlach and wife returned to Tillamook from Washington, D. C. on Tuesday. They went by way of New Orleans. Mr. Haberlach had the following to say when seen regarding his trip:

"We went to Washington by way of Los Angeles and New Orleans. I had to be in California early this winter so took the occasion of the eastern trip to take in San Francisco and Los Angeles. We left here on November 22 and arrived in San Francisco Saturday morning, working that town that day. Taking a night train we arrived in Los Angeles Sunday morning and were in Los Angeles until Tuesday morning, when we took the train for New Orleans, where we arrived Thanksgiving evening. We spent Friday in New Orleans and took the night train for Washington, where we arrived Sunday morning. We found Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Coats at the New Willard hotel and they took us to Mt. Vernon and the Arlington cemetery that afternoon. We spent four days at Washington and had the opportunity of becoming acquainted with the city and the points of interest around Washington. Washington is a wonderful city and we had occasion to visit the White House, and the Coats and ourselves were introduced and shook hands with President Coolidge. The women were each presented with a splendid rose from the White House garden by Mr. Sloop, the President's private secretary. The White House is a wonderful mansion and in reality shows up much better than the pictures of it indicate. We went through the various rooms and they should be seen to be appreciated. We also went through the Congressional library, the Smithsonian institute and the Lincoln memorial. We ascended the Washington monument, attended two meetings of the House, saw the Senate and attended a short session of the Supreme Court, which was presided over by ex-president Taft.

"On Tuesday we had our hearing before the Board of Engineers and altogether there were fourteen present including the entire Oregon delegation and the members of our committee. As shown by the press reports the showing made by the committee was favorable and the Board of Engineers is giving a favorable report on the appropriation asked for, \$250,000, for the improvement of the lower Tillamook bay project.

"It is, of course, unnecessary to state that unless Tillamook had sent a delegation to the hearing that nothing would have been done regarding the matter and I want to state that the committee did all in its power to put the matter before the committee in the proper light. Mr. Hawkins is an indefatigable worker and Mr. Coats made a good presentation of his proposition. I put up the matter from the dairymen's standpoint as I feel that the improvement will result in giving us lower rates on our cheese to Los Angeles and also on hay and grain when shipped to Tillamook.

"We spent Thursday in New York, Friday in Chicago, and Saturday in Minneapolis. We had matters of interest to be taken up in all three cities. We took a night train for Portland Saturday night and arrived there Monday morning.

"Altogether we had a most enjoyable and profitable trip and it is hard to say just what stands out most prominently in a trip of this kind. San Francisco shows a good business outlook for the future. Los Angeles is growing at such an amazing rate that it is hard to keep track of it. We took a trip to Long Beach and saw the famous Signal Hill, where they have been taking out millions of barrels of crude oil this year. We saw them retailing gas at 7c a gallon, plus 2c war tax. They were selling it at many places at 10c and 11c a gallon, but only at two places did we see them selling gasoline at 9c. We encountered a sand storm in the desert. We were put where our train got behind on the schedule two and one half hours within a few miles. They were cutting alfalfa hay in certain portions of the Imperial Valley, which is below sea level, and it seems near Thanksgiving time. The trip very wonderful to be doing this at from California to Texas is rather uninteresting. El Paso seems like a modern city in the south. We took very interesting place and is one of in the surrounding country around New Orleans including a trip to the historical Lake Pontchartrain, the old French quarter in New Orleans. One of the things that stick indelibly in ones mind is the endless number of negro huts in portions of Louisiana, the Carolinas, Alabama, and Georgia.

PLANS FOR TILLAMOOK FAIR GROUNDS

The voting at a recent special election in Tillamook county of a one-mill tax for county fair ground development was followed by a session of the fair board during which the 90-acre site was inspected and tentative plans laid for its improvement. It is thought likely that the fair buildings

will be patterned after those of the Pacific International, inter-connected and all practically under one roof, and that a race course will be provided of sufficient size and excellence to induce owners of the best track horses to bring them to Tillamook.

The substantial majority for the tax is a sign that interest in the county fair, which the Oregon Farmer has watched increasing year by year, is deep-rooted and genuine. As the Tillamook Headlight puts it, evidently "a majority of the taxpayers believe that the fair is an important factor in giving publicity to stock, farm and other interests of the county and therefore should be continued." The fair most decidedly is an important factor in such publicity, and Tillamook, which has a great many fine things to tell the world about, is to be congratulated upon this forward step. The old fairgrounds, which were rented from year to year, not only failed utterly to accommodate the crowds, but by its limitations set a mark beyond which the institution might not develop.

Squared away toward the goal of a new and better fair, there are experiences of other Oregon counties of which the directors may well take cognizance. The writer has in mind the contrasting examples of two counties with comparatively new grounds. One first of all secured the advice of competent architects, at Oregon Agricultural college, and as a result, in its fairground development, is working toward a compact whole which may never be finished, but which can always grow. The other, though like the first it began at the foundations, apparently had no plan and built merely as erstwhile convenience or the contractor dictated. The result here is a haphazard collection of buildings inconveniently located, without harmonious relation, and affording the visitor genuine puzzlement as to the motives which guided their construction. The contract is a painful one, but it is not overdrawn, and with many long years, we hope, of county fairs ahead of them, the people of Tillamook county should insist upon the spending of their gladly given money to the best possible advantage of the purpose intended.

YES, AN AGENT WAS HERE

The Oregonian published a statement gleaned from the Northern Pacific railroad company, and another from the Gales Creek & Wilson river railroad company last week, in which both organizations denied that they had right of way agents in Tillamook county securing deeds or other guarantees of right of way.
