Louie Labowitch, while short on decorations, is strong on window display of useful presents that will please the conservative Christmas buyer who wants to get value received for his money in wearing apparel. His windows are attracting much attention.

Larson & Hechtner have dainty but artistic decorations in their show windows, with a fine haberdashery display, baby blankets, and the latest in up to date goods for the entire family. The display caters to the practical side of Christmas buying, and embraces everything that should please a Christmas purchaser and suggest a choice of something sensible in presents.

Conover & Conover at their west side store have a pretty snow scene, with grocery suggestions, with a background of Elkhorn moss. Both stores have Christmas colors and designs, and show holiday cheer in

A meeting was held at Hillsboro last week, at which representative business men from Hillsboro, Forest Grove, and Tillamook pledged themselves to raise funds to assure the early start on the construction of what will be of as great value to Beaverton as the boring of the Council Crest tunnel, and that is the building of the Wilson River Highway from Forest Grove to Tillamook, a distance approximating 45 miles, of which thirty miles would be new grade.

This proposed highway will leave the inland Loop Highway at a point near Glenwood, crossing the summit of the coast range at an elevation of around 1200 feet and follow the Wilson river to within 5 miles of Tillamook city, opening up to the tourist and pleasure seeker 30 miles of the finest scenery and camping grounds found in Northwestern Oregon, besides providing a much shorter route from Tillamook to Portland and valley points by thirty miles, over which a great volume of the rich dairy products of Oregon would flow into the Oregon metropolis. It also brings the ocean beaches and resorts of the Tillamook country nearer to Portland's doors and that means that thousands of pleasure seekers and tourists will pass yearly through this city on their way to and from Portland to the Tillamook country. We all realize that out of that number a great number will be attracted by Beaverton and its environs if proper inducements

are put forth to bring them here, so it stands squarely up to the community to back up any movement toward the construction of this highway and bring that travel through Beaverton.

The present route via Newberg to Tillamook is 102 miles against 73 via Wilson River and Forest Grove.

This route leads one for 35 miles through the finest body of standing timber today on the American continent, past cataracts and waterfalls in the Wilson, through glades and dells, yet untouched by the woodman's axe. Each turn of the road will unfold a scene and beauty will challenge any roadway in the world to equal.—Banks Herald.

FAST RUN MADE

Breaking the record time of the famous Los Angeles Limited from Salt Lake City to Los Angeles by one hour and ten minutes, as stock 1924 Studebaker Special Six, driven by D. A. Jenkins of Salt Lake City, has established a motor car performance mark that is causing wide-spread comment among motorists along the Pacific coast.

This is the fastest that man has ever traveled overland between these two cities. It is one hour and fifty eight minutes—almost two hours—faster than the best previous motor car record.

The Arrowhead trail over which the record was made winds through many treacherous mountain passes and traverses hundreds of miles of desert roads. For this reason, and because no attempt was made to wait for ideal road and weather conditions, the feat is all the more impressive to those who are familiar with the route.

Even more remarkable than the speed attained was the endurance dis-

played by the car. Despite the fact that its cooling system was naturally subjected to severe test over the mountain and desert roads, no water was added to the radiator during the entire run. The American Express company sealed the filler cap at Salt Lake City and broke the seal at Los Angeles. When checked in at Los Angeles, the motor was running as smoothly and as quietly as it was when it left Salt Lake City.

The distance of 853 miles was covered by the Special-Six in 23 hours, 43 minutes. The best previous automobile record was 25 hours, 41 minutes and the time of the Los Angeles Limited is 24 hours, 50 minutes.

With the addition of this record, four official road records are now held by Studebaker in California. Considering the fact that the per capita ownership of automobiles in California is higher than in any other state, with the result that rivalry for automobile records is extremely keen, the accomplishments are all the more important. The three previous records have been held by the Studebaker Light-Six for nearly three years. They are:

Valley route record: Los Angeles to San Francisco; total distance, 411.1 miles. Official time, 9 hours, 15 minutes, 50 seconds.

Coast route record: Third and Townsend, San Francisco to Main postoffice, Los Angeles, total distance 453.7 miles. Official time, 10 hours, 12 minutes, 40 seconds.

Round Trip record: San Francisco to Los Angeles and return, south by coast route, north by valley; total distance, 864.8 miles. Official time, 21 hours, 23 minutes.

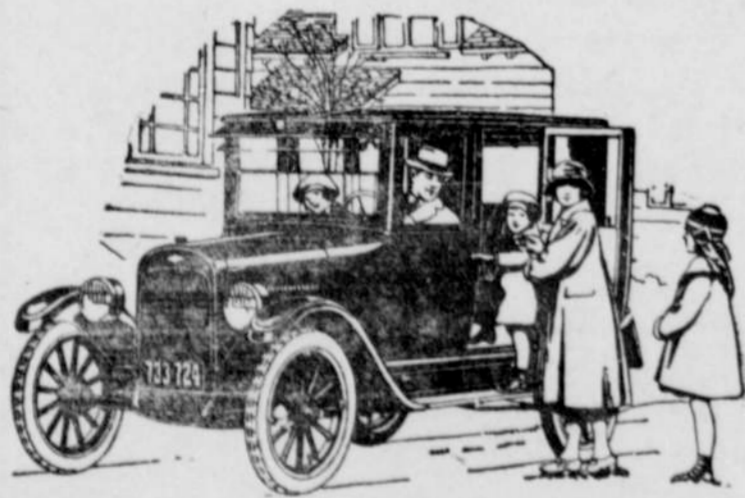
