She was born in Hastings, Minnesota, and in 1902 came west to the state of Washington, locating in Aberdeen, where she taught school until the date of her marriage to J. F. Stranahan, an architect of that city, which was in 1903. Previous to her coming west Mrs. Stranahan taught successfully in Northfield, Minn. where she displayed unusual ability in her chosen profession.

Mrs. Stranahan later came to Tillamook, and for some time was City Recorder. She was prominent in educational, civic and social circles, and had a host of friends who will miss her.

Deceased is survived by her husband J. F. Stranahan, and three children, as follows: Carlisle, a son, and Florence and Corinne, daughters. F. A. Beltz of this city is a brother, and Mrs. O. A. Schultz a sister. Another sister is Mrs. Amanda Legler of Minnesota, and still another brother resides in Utah.

Arrangements for the funeral had not been concluded at the time of going to press. Deceased was the head of the Christian Science church in this city, and the services probably will be under direction of that denomination.
