Of course, the great American spirit of fair play will soon revolt against such sentiments, those good people who have been duped by falsehood will awaken to the truth and the purveyors of hate, slander and disharmony will be sent into the oblivion which has buried their periodical predecessors.

Instead of going back some centuries to give garbled quotations from church dignitaries relative to the attitude of Catholics toward those who are not Catholics with regard to their chances for salvation, why not come down to modern times and quote for instance the encyclical letter of Pope Pius IX, August 10, 1863, in which he said: "It is known to us and to you that those who are in invincible ignorance of our most holy religion, but who observe carefully the natural law and the precepts given by God upon the hearts of all men, and who being disposed to obey God, lead an honest and upright life, may, aided by the light of Divine Grace, attain to eternal life; for God who sees clearly, searches and knows the heart, the disposition, the thoughts and intention of each, in His supreme mercy and goodness by no means permits that any one suffer eternal punishment who has not of his own free will fallen into sin."

Relative to implied accusation that the assassins of the Presidents were Catholics, it has been proven beyond question that not one of them, Booth, Guiteau or Czolgosz—was a Catholic. Read the testimony of Rev. R. B. Garrett, Baptist minister of Portsmouth, Va., also of Samuel Bland Arnold relative to the Lincoln assassination. Read Alexander's "Life and trial of Guiteau." Read the confession of Czolgosz published in the New York Journal of Sept. 8, 1901, also the dispatch from Auburn to the same paper dealing with the execution on October 29th, wherein it was stated among other things: "The assassin went to his death an anarchist and an infidel." Mr. Phelps cannot surely be ignorant of the truth in these cases, because he poses as a clergyman, an editor and a lecturer. If he is not informed, he is deceiving his patrons and the public; if he is informed then he is deliberately misleading them. Mr. Phelps refers in his mysterious

style to matters of history with which he is evidently not familiar, or he would be more careful. For instance, he says: "Was not McKinley the iron-willed president who handed to the Senate a report of the machinations of the Roman Catholic Church in the Philippines?" of course, nobody ever before called the gentle and lovable McKinley an "iron-willed" man or president, but that is immaterial. He did, at the request of the Senate in 1901 lay before it the report on the Philippines (document 190) which is an elaborate one and I hope your readers will find it and look it over. It is in the Portland public library and I find that the Commission making the report has the following statement and recommendation: "The Philippine people love the Catholic Church. The solemnity and the grandeur of its ceremonies appeal most strongly to their religious motives and it may be doubtful whether there is any country in the world in which the people have a more profound attachment for their church than this one."

"As the Catholic Church is and ought to continue a prominent factor in the life, peace, contentment and progress of the Philippine people, it would seem to be the wisest course, wherever it is possible to do so without infringing upon the principle that church and state must be kept separate, to frame civil laws which shall accord with views conscientiously entertained by Catholics—priests and laymen—and which shall not deal unfairly with a people of a different faith." A sample of duplicity and deception by Mr. Phelps is found in his statements relative to ex-Governor Olcott. Here is the original statement from Mr. Phelps as quoted in the Headlight of November 16th: "He also read an affidavit from a man who was partially initiated into the Knights of Columbus, in which the man stated that he recognized Ben W. Olcott in the ranks of the Knights of Columbus who sought to initiate him."

ROADS LOWER TAXES

(Continued from page 1) act wisely in taking advantage of the offers by the government and state to build these roads on a 50-50 basis. A majority of the people of Tillamook county, believe that the court acted wisely in taking advantage of the offer, and even though funds for other roads were diverted, as has been alleged, to finish the main highway, the concensus of opinion prevalent with business men and farmers and others is that such diversion did not in this instance constitute a serious offense. Ordinarily, perhaps, it would not be good practice, but many things are done by city and county authorities in just such emergencies of a similar nature, where public interests

are eventually greatly benefitted. Tillamook county, so far as indebtedness is concerned, is not half so badly off as are other counties of the state. From the amount of its total indebtedness, we should subtract all of the collectible delinquent taxes, which go to make up the total indebtedness. Another item which has generally been overlooked in matter of the expenditure by county of over \$70,000 for bridges approaches made necessary by floods of 1921, for which there never been a budget appropriation. This item also should be added to highway investment for the county.
