The taxes on the roll for the year 1922 have only recently become delinquent. These taxes are due for property which the taxpayers owned on the first day of March 1922. Those who criticize the officers may not know that under the present law, the taxes which are due and delinquent on such 1922 roll cannot be foreclosed until about November 1926...

The total taxes remaining uncollected on the rolls prior to the year 1919, and which are entitled to be foreclosed, amount to about \$64,000, or approximately 20 per cent of the total amount of outstanding delinquent taxes.

Taking all things into consideration it is not surprising that the tax situation is as bad as it is. What should be done is to repeal all existing tax laws, except in so far as they may be necessary to collect the taxes already levied...
