Mayor Baker was present and made a strong plea for a shorter road from Portland to Tillamook and a junction with the Roosevelt highway.

It was brought out at the meeting that Washington and Tillamook counties had paid for a survey down the Wilson river route, and the state railway commission was asked to make a survey down the north fork of the Trask to a junction with the old Trask toll road. On the Wilson

route there would be 12 miles of new construction and about 22 miles on the tentative Trask route. The commission, while stating that the state was pretty well supplied with state roads, admitted the value of a short route to the sea and a connection with the great coast highway now under construction. They also saw possibility of quicker mail delivery to the coast county, and many other advantages, and conceded that the road seemed to a wholly popular idea. The state highway commission took the matter of participation under advisement, and the friends of the new short route are hopeful that the commission will see the matter in a favorable light, later on.

The Portland automobile organizations are working hard for the road, and promise much publicity and active cooperation. In fact, the new road is off the ways and launched, and is making a very hopeful splash. Its friends say that the outlook is rosy. And that's the way the Tillamook representatives to Portland regard it.
