TILLAMOOK ROAD GETS GOVERNMENT AID

The government has approved the allotment of \$430,174 for aid in the completion of Oregon roads. This money will be spent in aid of highways extended through government lands in this state along the Roosevelt highway. The sum of \$228,500 will be used on the above highway between Neskowin in this county, and the Siletz, in Lincoln county. Another allotment for another section is for \$58,000.

The work on the Neskowin-Siletz section will be completed this year, this work already having been done upon this stretch of the Roosevelt highway. Upon its completion, Tillamook will be connected up with its sister county to the south, and furnish another link of completed highway for motorists and others, as far as it goes. It is also believed that the completion of the road to the Salmon river country will result in considerable trade coming to Tillamook from that hitherto isolated section of the country. There are being made by Sheridan and McMinnville to extend a road from Yamhill county into the Salmon river country for trade purposes. The Salmon river country is rich in dairying possibilities, and the business of that section is well worth looking after by Tillamook business men. A fight to that section by our business men is a body, later on, might be productive of good future results.

L. K. KUBLI VISITS TILLAMOOK

Hon. L. K. Kubli, candidate for United States Senator before the coming Oregon primaries, was in the city Wednesday and Friday of this week, visiting old friends. He was accompanied by Hon. D. E. Fletcher, chairman of the ways and means committee in the House during the last session of the legislature. Mr. Kubli expressed much interest while here in the Tillamook bay improvement and noted how long it would take to see a shorter auto route from Portland to this city, and as a result of several Portland automobiles he accompanied and good roads clubs, he volunteered active personal aid in the way of a shorter auto route to the sea. He will return to this county about the first of April, and probably will visit here on his address at that time. While here he was asked to speak before the legislative student body on American citizenship and complied Thursday evening with a short but excellent address which won favorable comment from the students.

(Continued from page 1) their refusal to handle oleo, it is said that a big wholesale house in Portland will ship oleo in to the county towns by parcel post; and that if the newspapers refuse to take oleo ads, that posters will be posted all over the county telling where oleo may be had, and at what price, etc. Altogether it looks as if a greasy war was in the offing, with all sails set. That the oleo people have friends in the city and county is evident by the talk on the streets. The great burning question is whether we shall say "pass the butter," or "pass the oleo." It looks like butter. The oleo people have gone so far as to threaten if the merchants and the dairy people here persist in barring their product, they in turn will stop buying Tillamook cheese—and a lot of the local cheese is sold through some of the oleo manufacturers. The cheese people, however, do not seem to be worrying about the outcome of this. There is a strong possibility, say some, that many of the merchants who signed the agreement barring oleo will go back on the paper and try to satisfy the demands of the manufacturers and some of the customers who demand the synthetic bread grease. It is expected that thousands of dollars will be spent in this county to combat the action taken by the dairymen, for the oleo makers are afraid that the sentiment started here will spread to other parts of the United States.

BEND CALF MAN ACQUITTED

The trial of Kenneth E. Hellum of Bend, in the United States circuit court, charged with using the mails with intent to defraud in the now celebrated Bend calf case, resulted in Hellum's acquittal last Thursday. There was a coloring of Tillamook interest in the case, due to the fact that J. Merle Smith, who was then in the business of shipping calves from this county, is the man who shipped the calves to the order of Hellum, and a man claiming to be

Ole Swanson, later bid the calves in when they were sold for charges and keep, owing to Hellum's failure to receive the calves as agreed upon. Hellum's acquittal on the above charge ended the government's interest in the case. Evidence was produced at the trial that there was such a man as Ole Swanson at one time in Bend; but he had removed previous to the trial, and could not be located by the government either before or during the trial. That Swanson probably had something to do with the acquittal of the defendant.
