WHEAT AND BREAD PRICES. COST OF WHEAT IS SMALL PART OF COST OF THE LOAF

"A 50 per cent raise in the price of wheat would not materially affect the price of a loaf," says Walter J. Robinson, manager of the Washington Wheat Growers' association.

"Wheat is the smallest item that enters into the cost of a loaf of bread. A barrel of flour will make on an average 285 loaves, retailing at 10 cents per loaf, or a total of \$28.50.

the loaf only 3-4 cent. However, the price of the loaf does not fluctuate with the price of wheat, so it is highly improbable that the price to the consumer would be increased," thinks Mr. Robinson.

"The purchasing power of the farmer is now 50 per cent below that of 1915. In 1915 a binder cost the farmer 279 bushels of wheat. Today this binder requires 428 bushels of wheat.

Mr. Robinson cites these facts to show the need of aid to the wheat-growing business. He is convinced that if the McNary-Haugen bill is enacted into legislation the wheat industry will be placed back on its feet—Idaho Farmer.

loaf presses, 19 feet 6 inches long, each of which will hold about 1200 pounds of cheese at a filling. These vats are made from fine selected fir, and are bolted with iron rods, which in turn are covered with wooden plugs smoothed down to a level with the body of the outside, so that the rods will not catch on the clothing of the cheese makers.

A new factory at Orestown is being fitted with the loaf vat, and other up-to-date fixtures by the Pye shop; in fact, that establishment, which employs seven workmen, not inclusive of Mr. Pye and his son Archie, is kept on the jump filling orders for cheese vats and whey tanks, and other factory installations in connection with cheese making.
