ed determination to seek this treasure. But it was not until he was 50 years of age that Smith actually began his excavations on Necarney mountain, following a well thought plan for two years he worked; but one thing is remarkable in that connection—there is no proof that he ever got discouraged. True there must have been times of depression; times when he was weary both in mind and body; but when he quit up there, he quit with exactly the same idea that he had when he began quest of the buried treasure. Of one thing he is convinced. The treasure is there, and it was cunningly hidden by men of intelligence, who made false measurements and erected false monuments to mislead all who might later seek to find it. The question arises at this point in the mind of the reader: What became of the men who buried it; and if they escaped, why did not they or some of their descendants appear upon the scene with a carefully marked plat, and unearth the treasure? Mr. Smith doesn't know anything about that. What he believes is that the treasure, whatever it may consist of, is where the strange men in the "big stick canoe" left it. To determine just where it was left, caused Pat Smith to spend all the money he could earn or had, in addition to two years of hard work. It might be asked what was Mr. Smith doing all the years from his boyhood up to the time he began the search? Outwardly, he pursued the same honest vocation that other men pursued; but plus that, his friends believe that he was studying out the best methods of securing the buried treasure, and the way he went at it, proves that the latter theory is right. Pat Smith is a thinker. He has been called visionary, but all men who do things are visionary to a greater or less extent. The man without vision or imagination never makes much of a splash in this world. All inventors have it. Edison is a man of vision. ELCHES BURIED NEAR TILLAMOOK

Talking with Mr. Smith last week, the writer asked him whether he ever saw Kelches, the chief of the Tillamook Indians, to which he replied: "Yes, I have seen Kelches many a time, when I was a boy. I have not only seen him but I have talked with him. He was a good friend to the whites. He kept his word. What did he look like? Well, I think he had grey blood in his veins, and considerable of it. His hair was curly or kinky like that of a negro, and he was a large man, was straight in form, and had a strong face and features. There are few whites now living who ever saw Kelches. I think at Mrs. Rhoda Johnson, who was a sick, has seen Kelches. There may be others. Do I know where Kelches is buried? Yes, sir. He was buried at what is known as Rudder Rock, at where the government jetty saves Dick's point, about three miles on Tillamook, on the bay side, above the water marks, and on the south side of the bay. He was buried in a grave, and over that was built a tall house; but both the house and now have doubtless decayed and lie in ruins. He died either in 1862 or 1863. I am not certain which of those years. As I remember he was still young in years, but was not considered very old at the time of his death."

BIG FIRE HERE WAS IN 1868

Mr. Smith says that the big fire that raged through the western slope of the Coast range must have originated somewhere in Clatsop county, for that is where it came from. The burned-over hills east of this city, were in that fire, and millions of big firs, spruce and hemlock were a part of the conflagration. Mainly, however, the fire swept along the higher levels, back from the beach, and sped southward, going far down the coast through Lincoln and other counties to the south of us. It must have taken place in summer, when fanned and aided by the strong north winds that prevail at that season of the year. The Indians and early settlers here, say that it was the greatest fire ever had within their time. Smaller fires have spread over the coast section within the memory and observation of the old settlers.

Previous to the big fire of 1868, was the big fire on the Nestucca river, which swept from the east to the west over a large territory. This was before the Nestucca Indian chief Harna was sent to the Grand Ronde reservation. He and his tribe fled with their women and children and horses to the big sand spit near the present town of Woods, and stayed until the roaring, seething fire had spent its force in the mountains and uplands. According to this old Indian, who talked of the event before his death, at the Grand Ronde Indian reservation, deer, elk, and cougars and other wild animals were hemmed in and cooked crisp before the leaping flames that ran with the speed of a race horse. Other animals, stated the old chief, got to the beaches, and were to be seen commingling in apparent amity, their savage natures subdued by the terror of the flames. This fire, states Mr. Smith burned off one side or end of Hebo mountain, a prominent Tillamook land mark.

Mr. Smith accounts for his initials—P. H. M.—thus: "My father and mother could not agree upon a name for me, when I was born. My father wanted to call me Patrick Henry Smith, in honor of Patrick Henry, the old colonial orator, but to this, my mother had objection; so they compromised by calling me Patrick Henry Marshall Smith, the latter name being my mother's maiden name. As they did not have much else to give me, they made up for that lack, by giving me three surnames. But, I have managed to stagger along with them. Most of the old timers call me plain "Pat", and that suits me all right."
