**MRS. MARY JANE CONE**

Mary Jane Cone, who for thirty-six years past has resided at the family home in this county on the Kelch river, died at her home last Tuesday afternoon, aged 78 years. Deceased was born in the state of New

York, and grew to womanhood there, later coming to Oregon in 1887, when she and her husband settled in Tillamook county on the place where she died. Her husband, W. S. Cone preceded her to the land beyond about a year and a half ago. Mrs. Cone was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church at Bay City at the time of her death, and leaves many friends in this county.

Immediate relatives of the deceased are Judge A. M. Hare of this city, and W. S. Hare who lives near this place. Both are brothers of the deceased. There are a number of other relatives in the county and state left to mourn her departure.

Funeral services will be held at the Christian church today at 2 p. m., Rev. W. C. Blackwell of the Bay City M. E. church officiating.

**LEACH FARM HOUSE UP WILSON BURNS**

The large farm house owned by Henry Leach, up Wilson river about twelve miles, burned to the ground last Tuesday, shortly after the dinner hour. The family was up in some green timber, a short distance from the house, working on a road, when they first saw the fire. When they got to the house it was a mass of flames. The house with all its contents, was burned, including the woodshed. There was insurance covering to the amount of \$2,000 in the agency of Gilham & White of this city. So rapid was the progress of the fire that nothing could be saved. All clothing, excepting that which was worn by the family at the time, was lost. The three Leach boys lost close to \$500 worth of personal belongings, including guns and clothing. It is not known how the fire started, but probably was from a defective flue.
