is carrying a full line of seed grains. Alfalfa hay is being sold at \$20 out of the house for the best grade and \$19 off cars. It is thought that farmers desiring to contract for next seasons requirements would do well to take on part of their requirements now, as hay will probably be higher next fall than it is at this time. This would probably be due to the fact that there is very little snow in the mountains and irrigation water is going to be very scarce. In fact, it is thought now that there will be a good crop of first cutting hay and a fair crop of second cutting hay in most sections. Ordinarily there are three cuttings. Hay from the Willamette valley is very cheap at this time.

ELIMINATE POISONS AND LIVE FOREVER

There are poisons that are developed within the body. The life processes produce poison as by-product. The liver destroys these poisons and the skin, lungs, kidneys, and bowels eliminate them. These poisons cause old age and eventually death. Were it possible to insure perfect elimination we might live indefinitely. It is therefore important that elimination be promoted by efficient kidney action.

regular bowel movements, and an active skin.

It is not alone important to eliminate the poison produced within the body, but it is just as important to keep out of the body poison from outside. Drugs, self-administered as medicine, and habit forming drugs are important causes of physical impairment. The type of medication which is particularly harmful is the taking of headache powders, which in no instance effect a cure of the underlying cause. The abuse of purgatives and laxatives is another type of poison.

However, the most common form of poisoning is infection. Infections are due to the growth in the body of minute animal or vegetable forms commonly known as germs. Infections enter the body through the skin and mucous membranes. These germs are carried from person to person and the diseases which they cause are known as "catching." Most of these germs develop in the body and leave by way of the discharges. Mouth sprays, sneezing, coughing, and kissing may convey the infection to others. Infected persons and carriers may through their discharges infect water, food, and eating utensils. Infection is spread by unclean hands and promiscuous expectoration. Water supplies are infected by sewage.

Avoid infection by keeping away from congested places during epidemics. Keep away from persons who are sick with acute infection. Know that the persons who are handling your food are not "disease carriers." Use no water or milk that is not carefully safeguarded by the health department. Milk that is not properly pasteurized may contain dangerous germs. There is danger of infection from germs in swimming pools that are not constantly filtered and chemically purified.

Although most healthy people's germs are not disease germs and are therefore harmless to other people, it is hard to tell when even healthy people may get disease germs from some one else. Try not to let other people pass on their germs to you, especially if they have any kind of disease germs such as tuberculosis, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, measles, etc. Persons having on them or in them, germs of communicable disease, must be controlled. To do this properly means intimate attention and supervision of infected persons by health authorities who know their business and do nothing else.

Ordinance, was again tabled until the next meeting. One of the owners of the stage line was in the city and made a statement that his line had again put on a night schedule by which a stage left Portland for this city at midnight, and that it could bring first class mail to this city by 5 a. m. each morning. He stated that the Tillamook mail is made up at 11 o'clock p. m. each night at the Portland post-office, and could be brought here at the early hour above mentioned, while by the present method of transportation, it is delivered in this city at 5 p. m. This stage now carries the Oregonian to this city.

A committee of women from the Tillamook Women's club was present, and asked for permission to beautify the triangular tract on Third street and Sixth avenue, east, by the planting of flowers, etc., thus adding to the attractiveness of the city. The request sounded so reasonable, that the council immediately gave the desired permission.

A communication asking for a street light on Eighth street, was received and read, and upon motion of Councilman Pankow, action was deferred until next fall, as summer and long days were in the offing.

F. W. Talbot, manufacturer of Tillamook soda water and other soft drinks, was present and renewed his contention that he was being discriminated against in the city of his adoption, where he paid good sized city taxes, in that he was not permitted to sell soda water in the city without paying a \$50 license. He thought he should be able to supply local stores and others, and that the ordinance ought to be classified, so that stores could retail his goods on a smaller license. The council saw the apparent justice of his contention, and the city attorney was asked to add another class of license, when the present ordinance could be amended to cover the case of the local manufacturer.

It was suggested by a number of the council, and mentally coincided in by the reporters present, that Mr. Talbot should bring up some of his soda-water, and allow them to sample same to determine its food values, which he promised to do. Likewise it might be a good plan for the retailers of carbonated drinks and ice-cream to join with Mr. Talbot, and give a joint demonstration. Maybe,

the baker could be induced to demonstrate on cake, and thus relieve the monotony of a long session of the city law makers, by a soft-drink banquet.

City Attorney Hall, and Thomas Coates, fire chief, reported on the committee work allotted them in the matter of a proposed extension of the city fire limit boundaries. They will have their investigation in shape for the next meeting, when the council probably will amend the ordinance relating to fire limit boundaries, and take in more territory.

The resignation of A. H. Gaylord, former city treasurer was accepted,

and John Mathers appointed to the unexpired term of his predecessor. Chief Coates of the volunteer department, asked permission of council to fix up the attic above the fire department's club room. This is unused at present, and could be converted into a cosy dormitory for firemen, who would be near in case of a fire alarm, and thus adding efficiency to the company. Councilman Merrick was asked to look into the feasibility of the matter, and report at the next meeting.
