

ORATORICAL CONTEST HERE!

MISSIONARY TELLS ABOUT AFRICA

Rev. Ira Gillett last Thursday night delivered a very interesting talk on Africa at the First M. E. church of this city. There was a large attendance, and the missionary who is a regularly ordained Methodist minister, introduced by Rev. Hamrick, local pastor. Present with Rev. Gillett district superintendent Gilbert of Salem.

Rev. Mr. Gillett has recently returned from his station as a missionary in East Africa, in what is known as Portuguese Africa, and his station is on the east coast, where up to a short time ago he has resided for five years. His real home is at Talent, in Clatsop county, Oregon. He is home on a short furlough, and will soon return to his African work. His description of the natives, their habits, customs and life, was intensely interesting, and the speaker revealed facts at the outset that he was no stranger to the platform. In fact, he entertained with graphic descriptions of the dark race, that was con-

cluded all too quickly for the audience. His idea is that the black man differs very little from the Caucasian races, except in color. They have a wonderful aptitude for knowledge, and are eager for information, the Christian religion, and for parts of the white man's civilization, though they make objection that some of it does require explanation. For instance, they cannot understand why the black races in Africa are kept in ignorance and commercial slavery on starvation wages to dig diamonds and work in the gold and silver mines. They claim that they cannot reconcile such treatment with what they are taught by the missionaries that they are as much God's children as the whites.

The speaker said that in revealing our civilization before these quick-witted people, its faults and failures were indeed, hard to explain to these alleged "heathen." The only solution of these hard questions was that the white man's civilization had its two aspects, the good and the bad side, and that seemed partially satisfactory, at least.

The speaker told of one negro of the tribe among which he lived, who came back from the United States a thoroughly educated man, and who had college degrees that the white missionaries sent over to minister to the "heathen," did not possess. He is devoting his life to missionary efforts in his own tribe, and was described as a thoroughly consecrated man.

At the close of the lecture, a large collection of Africa implements were displayed by Mr. Gillett, which showed the ingenuity and natural mechanical ability of the common natives. One was a door lock made entirely of teak wood, and from which no doubt the inventor of American locks of a similar kind, first got his idea, and should be paying a royalty to a humble, uneducated African negro. Other instances were related which showed the wonderful natural ability of the people of the "dark continent." An "Oregon boy" of 50 years, Mr. Gillett met a number of Tillamookers whom he had formerly known, and he was familiar with this county.

PIERCE LEADS IN REFORM WORK

Governor Pierce has invited the executives of Washington and Idaho to join in a call for a northwest citizens' law enforcement congress to be held in Portland June 3 to 5, inclusive.

In letters sent to Governor Hart of Washington and Governor Moore of Idaho the Oregon executive said: "Believing that the states of Wash-

ington, Idaho and Oregon should lead in a crusade against law violation and dishonesty in every form, I have decided to ask you to join me, as governor of Oregon, in a call for a northwest citizens' law enforcement congress, to be held in Portland June 3, 4 and 5.

"I have assurances from many churches and anti-saloon leagues of these three northwestern states that these organizations will do everything in their power to make such a congress a success so that the citizens of the northwest may be quickened and the conscience of the people aroused for the enforcement of every law, including the prohibition statutes.

"Dishonest officials and lax law enforcement today threaten the life of our civilization, the most perfect that man has developed. The people demand action and the time is ripe for

a mighty movement for vigorous and effective enforcement of all laws.

"I suggest that you issue a call to all organizations in your state that are especially interested in law enforcement to send delegations to the proposed congress. Your attendance in person would add materially to the strength of the movement. It is possible for us to create such a sentiment in this great northwest that it will sweep the nation and drive from office every official who is not today doing his full duty."

Mr. Laughary talked about the

growth of the Jersey breed in Oregon, and the development of the calf club idea throughout the state.

"Tillamook county," said the speaker, "has made a better showing in calf club work than any county in the state!"

Dr. J. N. Shaw, county veterinary, spoke on the dangers of the "foot and mouth" disease, now so prevalent in California, and said if the disease should reach Oregon, there was danger that this county might be affected.

County Agent Fine talked along the lines of the importance of advertising the county's dairy industries. His idea was to keep Tillamook county on the map at all times by progressive work, and by taking the initiative in all matters calculated to aid and protect the dairy industry, which is our greatest permanent business asset.

The club passed a resolution asking the County Creamery association to donate funds to help defeat the oleomargarine referendum bill.

A committee was also appointed to formulate a resolution to show the sentiment of the club toward business men of this county who handle oleomargarine products.

The next meeting of the Jersey Cattle club will be held at Fairview, sometime next month.
