NEW CHURCH IS READY

Kemp, William Dollarhide, E. R. Horner, Arthur H. Nichols, J. H. Wood, G. W. Richardson, Donald McLachland, R. M. Corner, M. P. Dixon, R. E. Dunlop, Stacy, A. Smith, B. F. Peck, Gabriel Sykes, A. J. Hollingsworth, D. L. Shrode, I. V. Parker, J. F. Dunlap, W. J. Weber, Edward Gittens, A. F. Lacy, C. E. Gibson, G. O. Oliver, C. L. Dark, and the present pastor, Simpson Hamrick. The present pastor was appointed to the charge by Bishop W. O. Shepard at the conference at Salem, September 1922. The membership numbered one hundred three, and increased during the conference year to one hundred seven. During the conference year subscription for a new church was secured and plans formulated for a new

building.

A building committee was appointed by the pastor and confirmed by the quarterly conference consisting of some of the best business men in the city. The names are as follows: Senator C. J. Edwards, chairman, George B. Lamb, secretary and treasurer, A. G. Deals, T. H. Goyno, George P. Winslow, Edwin Boquist, Cal Franklin, E. S. Wright and the pastor.

Sod was broken the 26th day of July, 1923, in the presence of a large enthusiastic gathering. Mrs. Sarah [unclear], one of the church members in years and one of the largest donors to the new building, lifting the first shovel of dirt.

The corner stone was laid by the district superintendent of Salem district, Dr. E. E. Gilbert, September 23, 1923. The contract for the superstructure was let in October and the building rushed to completion. The ground and building complete with furnishings will total almost \$39,000.

The building is 98x52 feet. The basement is 84x52 feet. The basement is four feet below grade line and has sixteen full size casement windows, making it a perfectly lighted room and divided up as follows: A kitchen furnace and fuel room, two toilet rooms, two class rooms, beside a large auditorium room to be divided up into class rooms with folding partitions for Sunday school work.

The upper room or main auditorium is divided up as follows: Two rooms

at the right and left of the pulpit for choir, small church meetings, and class rooms for adults. The choir loft is back of the pulpit and will seat thirty people. The balcony will seat one hundred and sixty four. The main auditorium will seat three hundred and fifty. The large room to the rear of the auditorium will seat fifty or more and will be used for young peoples' meetings and prayer services.

The balcony and all the rooms are seated with opera chairs while the main auditorium is seated with quarter-sawn oak pews with three ply ends.

The building is well lighted through out. The windows are made of art glass of variegated colors but giving plenty of light with a pleasant effect upon the eye. The inside is plastered with a wainscoting of a light oak design. The outside is finished in stone-tone stucco, giving it a light gray appearance. The people outside of the membership of the church are very much elated over the beauty and prominence of the building.

It is located on the state highway through the city, and is the most centrally located of any church in town, being just one block west and one block south of the center of the city.

The building will be dedicated Sunday, the 13th, by Bishop W. O. Shepard, of Portland, Oregon. The public in general is invited to be present at all the services on that day.

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
