OUR EDITORIAL POLICY

REST PROTECTION NOT DIFFICULT

Rest Protection Week for 1924 has been designated by President Harding and Governors Hart and Forrester for April 21-27, inclusive, and the District Forester's office has issued proclamations to that effect.

These proclamations, the president and the governors call attention to the appalling losses that occur each year from forest fires, and urge all citizens, either in association or as individuals, to protect all wooded areas from fire. It is peculiarly fitting that the governors of Oregon and Washington should issue special messages of rest protection for within these states are the greatest stands of timber left in the United States. Governors of many other states will issue proclamations supplementing the one issued by the president and governor in several states observed during Forest Protection Week.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, Greeley, Chief Forester, and District Forester Geo. H. Cecil have emphasized the importance of preventing forest fires, about 11,000 acres of land in the United States are lost each year from forest fires.

ful with fire while in wooded areas. District Forester Cecil gives the following simple rules which if observed will go far toward reducing the appalling number of man-caused forest fires reported every year in the Pacific Northwest:
 Be sure match is out before throwing it away; don't throw cigars, cigarettes, and pipe ashes along the roadside; build small camp fires away from brush and small trees; never leave your camp fire unwatched; make sure your camp fire is dead—then bury it; keep in touch with forest rangers and firewardens and report all fires you may see, no matter how small; be as careful with fire while you are in wooded areas as you would be in your own home.

William Hunter, who owns a schooner by the same name, has been hired by the state fish commission to work along the coast this year and kill sea-lions. He will use explosives mainly, and will not have to scalp the dead sea-lions, as he will be hired on a straight salary. So, Mr. Hunter will save the expense of keeping a grindstone on his boat this year, as there will be no call to sharpen his scalping knife, as he formerly had to do. This no doubt will be a pleasing change to Captain Hunter, as turning a grindstone, and sharpening up his scalplifter last year gave him an extremely tired feeling, when he should have felt full of pep and good humor. He will thus be relieved of much of the "grind" of his former onerous duties.

With \$472,760.77 in the county depositories, it doesn't look as though Tillamook county was in such a horrible condition financially as some of the hired mourners for certain timber interests would have it appear.

After the primaries and the election have passed, you won't hear the blood-curdling lamentations of the hired calamity howlers. They will be out of a job. When you see a man working overtime to pour calamity stuff in to the ears of the uninformed, it is well to wonder just what his interest in the matter. Most of the hired boys are men who do not own a cent's worth of property in the county. Why should they be so frantic in trying to discredit the county? It's easy when you stop and think for a moment.

METHODIST CHURCH HAS DEDICATION

The new Methodist church on Second avenue, this city, was formally dedicated last Sunday forenoon by Bishop Wm. O. Shepherd of Portland, assisted by District Superintendent Dr. Gilbert of Salem, and Rev. Simpson Hamrick, resident pastor.

The church was filled with home people and visitors from neighboring county towns, and was appropriately decorated with lilies of the valley, ferns and other flowers.

A special choir furnished selections, and another musical feature was a solo by Ira T. Morgan of Portland.

Bishop Shepherd chose as his text the 15th chapter of John, with reference to the 7th and 8th chapters in Romans.

Outstanding sentences in his sermon were:

"Without Christ there is no effective building."

"Faith is a tunnel through which God can contact the human heart."
 "In all things we must have divine help; as when man fails, his only recourse is to God."
 "The greatest improvement in this world, is the improvement of the soul."

"The Christian man is better equipped for the battle of life than the non-Christian."

Throughout the sermon was accented with the central thought of faith in God, for in that way come all spiritual blessings. Bishop Shepherd is a great preacher, and his greatness consists in his simplicity, and his able presentation of the truth.

Prior to the dedication of the new building, church steward, C. J. Edwards, gave a summary of the church indebtedness, and stated that there was needed the further sum of \$6,647 to dedicate the church free of debt. In a few minutes the entire amount was pledged by those present, and the dedication followed. After that ceremony, a community dinner was had in the basement of the church which was partaken of by a large number of people present.

During the afternoon services, the rite of baptism was conferred upon a number of children at 3 p. m. Bishop Shepherd also preached in the evening of the same day to a large audience.

The church will cost a little over \$30,000 in its completed form, and is one of the finest edifices of its kind between Astoria and Coos bay.

TILLAMOOK STUDENTS IN TYPING CONTEST

Bishop Sumner and Portlanders who are interested in the mission work of the Episcopal church, and with what money can be raised locally, it is expected that sufficient funds will be obtained to erect the parish house as soon as possible and defer the building of the church building later, as the parish house can be used for the present for a place of worship and social purposes.

The plans of the buildings are drawn with the idea of obtaining the best accommodations with as small expense as possible, there being no intentions whatever in erecting costly buildings, but simply those of a modern and up-to-date character that will be sufficient for a number of years to come.

There is some prospect of a clergyman being placed in charge of the three mission churches at Hillsboro, McMinnville and Tillamook. This would enable him to devote more time to them than Archdeacon Black can do at the present time with so many other mission churches to supply and look after.
