The final score was 11 in favor of the Jersey-Holstein combination.

(Continued from page 1) The Tillamook fire department was on the scene. The Whitney mill at Garibaldi also rendered considerable assistance. The plant closed down as soon as the alarm was received and fifty men were dispatched with hose lines, shovels and other equipment.

The loss to the Oregon Silver Spruce company, which is a subsidiary of the Oregon Box company of Portland, has not been officially made known. The mill was partly covered by insurance. Mr. Thompson carried some insurance on his home. Other losses were sustained by C. Dye, whose log towing boat was destroyed.

A Mr. Bowman lost a fish boat. An automobile belonging to a Southern Pacific section forman went up in flames. The Coast Power company loss in transmission amounted to between \$800 and \$1000, covered by insurance.

A gasoline boat with 50 gallons of fuel in a tank was saved. Had it exploded, it would have created additional hazard for homes nearby.

The spruce mill had been running at 60,000 feet capacity cut.
