

**HOSPITAL BEING REBUILT**

A new section is being added to the Boals hospital which covers 94 by 26 feet of ground. This new addition will double the present capacity of the hospital and when completed it will be as modern and well equipped as any in the state. It will be possible to care for fifty-two patients at one time.

On the second floor there will be two large modern surgeries, an X-ray room, a sterilizing room and a large ward. The lower floor will contain private rooms and another large ward. It is planned to install an electric elevator which will be an invaluable convenience. A new set of electric sterilizers, costing \$2,000 will be part of the new equipment.

Water equipment for fire fighting is being put in and the building is being made with a view to eliminating the fire hazard.

The building will cost between \$15,000 and \$16,000 when completed. Sheldon and Dallas, local contractors have charge of the work.
