In the year 1890 they came to Tillamook county, Oregon, residing at Nehalem for five years, the remainder of the time until her death with her son Andrew Anderson at Tillamook, Oregon.

Her husband passed away in Tillamook three years ago.

She is survived by her two sons, Andrew Anderson of Tillamook Oregon and Lewis Anderson of Bay City, Oregon; eight grand children, Mrs. Hilma M. Norberg of Satsop, Washington, Lewis O. Anderson of Montesano, Washington, Henry W. Edna K. and Ethel C. Anderson of Tillamook and Laurin V., Veldon M. and Harvard E. Anderson of Bay City, Oregon; three great grandchildren, Vern, Donald and Bonita Anderson of Montesano, Washington, all of which were at her bedside during her last illness.

She was converted and united with the Baptist church in the year 1873 to which she held her affiliation until her death. She passed away quietly and peacefully with a firm faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

The funeral was held from the family home of Andrew Anderson on Thursday the 15th at 1:30 p. m., Rev. Louis Anderson preaching the sermon and Miss Christine Anderson singing two solos. Interment was in L. O. O. F. cemetery.—Contributed.

REAL ESTATE MAN TRAVELS

Starting Saturday morning and returning Wednesday J. L. Ketch and family put 913 miles on the speedometer in a trip thru Washington which combined business and pleasure. At this time of year the high way which is paved all the way to British Columbia and beyond, with the exception of three or four miles of detour, is lined with beauty, dogwood, scotch broom, fruit and shade trees being in full bloom. A smoky haze dimmed the view of Washington's superb snow ranges but the interesting foreground compensated in a measure for the veiled horizon.

In speaking of the trip Mr. Ketch said: "I saw some fine country but none which shook my loyalty to Tillamook and some which greatly strengthened it. There are sections of dairy country around Woodland, Seattle, Sedro-Wolley and Bellingham which compare favorably with our meadows at this time of year. Whether they are able to maintain this luxuriance thru the summer, I cannot say, but I doubt it as the weather is very warm there already. Thru these sections the predominance of pure bred Holstein herds was noticeable, Guernsey's taking second place. In talking with members of the Whatcom county dairy association who are very proud of their organization the average price received by them for butter fat last year was quoted as 48 cents. They could hardly believe that during the same year our price averaged 61 cents. One man said, 'How do you do it? We make just as good cheese as you do.' An interested bystander spoke up. 'I'll tell you how they do it. I was in the grocery business for fifteen years and every time I tried to cut out Tillamook cheese the demand drove me back to it. It's the reputation does it.'

"At every halt the interest in Tillamook manifested itself. Men stopped us and asked for information and literature and not a few declared their intention of visiting this section. The president of the Whatcom County Guernsey club expects to come down this summer with a view to locating. The trip was a revelation to me in many ways and I returned grateful for the conditions here that justify the most enthusiastic selling talk. I wouldn't have the nerve to try to sell some of the stuff we passed thru, especially that section along the highway from Centralia to Olympia. Tillamook looks mighty good to me after driving for miles thru country where the quality of the soil was indicated by a sign which frankly advised, 'Use our stone. You can't beat it.'

While residing in this county he identified himself with the democratic party, filling the office of state committeeman for Tillamook county, and he became the leader of that party in this county. He was a prominent Mason and the funeral, which took place at McMinnville on Wednesday, was in charge of members of that order.

The deceased had many friends in this county who were sorry to hear of his demise.
