OREGON GUERNSEYS TO THE FRONT

Guernseys—Oregon Guernseys—come to the front in the March report for cow testing association work in 11 western states, a Guernsey herd from Tillamook occupying first place among 45 herds of 15 cows or under, leaders in as many different associations, and a Guernsey cow from Tillamook heads the list of 48 animals which were leading cows for the month in their respective test groups. The herd is that of four purebreds owned by Homer Mason, which many times has led the Tillamook Association, and which in March averaged 65.6 pounds each. The cow is one owned by Ira G. Lance that produced 122.5 pounds of fat, distancing her nearest competitor by five pounds and being one of only three in the entire west that made over 100 pounds for the month. After several months spent at the bottom of the column, during the winter period when few of them are encouraged to produce, Oregon association cows have resumed their place at the top, the average of 86 herds, 2399 cows, being 35.54 pounds per cow, or more than two pounds each above that of their nearest competitors.—Oregon Farmer.
