PARISH COMMUNITY HOUSE AND AUDITORIUM BEING BUILT

Excavation work has begun on the basement of a general assembly and banquet hall that is to be built on the Catholic church property at Fifth street and Seventh avenue east. It will be a wooden building 40 feet by 100 feet with good concrete basement. In the interior will be built a partial balcony and a stage with complete equipment, 28 by 14 feet. It is to have a seating capacity of about 300 people. The building committee expects it to be completed about October 1.

WATCH FOR THE RED LINE WHEN IN PORTLAND

Red lines clear across the pavement on streets intersecting major traffic will warn all motorists to come to a dead stop before entering these arteries, if the plan proposed by City Commissioner Pier is adopted by the city council of Portland, and there is no indication of opposition.

Pier announced Saturday that within a few days he will prepare his recommendations, based on a report from Fred M. West, captain of the traffic bureau. This will show the accidents on various main arteries, and it is proposed to select as a beginning five major arteries upon which to apply the "full stop" system for the side streets.

If the plan proves successful in eliminating accidents it will be extended. The system is in use in various other large cities and has proved highly effective.

It is proposed to assign motorcycle officers to the streets selected for the trial to educate the public in observance of the new system. First offenses will be met with a warning, but repeated violations will bring fines, says Pier.

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
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
