

WEDNESDAY TAKES TILLAMOOK BOY

The community was saddened last evening by news of the death of Burton Loraine King, who has been suffering for some time from leakage of the heart. Loraine lived in Tillamook with his parents since he was about five years of age having moved here with his parents from Ashland, Oregon, where he was born. He had finished the high school here and had spent two years in the local high school thereupon entering the Benning Polytechnic high school for boys in Portland. He had finished a one-year course in electrical engineering at the time of his death. After having spent two weeks in a hospital in Portland, he came home apparently improved in health. He took on Tuesday evening and gradually grew worse until his death. He was popular and ambitious, leaving many friends. The funeral services were held in the Nazarene church on June 10.
