CAMP IS DEVELOPING

Happy camp, perhaps the oldest of the Tillamook resort for beach improvements. A bulkhead has been driven for about a hundred feet along the edge of the camp along the beach. This has been filled with a good solid foundation and supports twenty cottages for tourists. Two pipes for fresh water have been put down to the beach so that clam diggers can clean their camps there without bringing up the camp as is usually done at camps where clams are plentiful as they are around Nehalem.

There are fifteen row boats for the use of the tourist who likes to row or if rowing does not appeal to them three small light draft row boats may be procured to take tourists across the bay to the sand beach and other points on the bay. The "Eagle" makes regular trips to the rocks outside the surf and to other points of interest along the bay.

**BUYERS' WEEK IN PORTLAND AUGUST 18-23**

Special, Portland, Ore, June 25.—Merchants of the Northwest will be entertained by the most extensive and most elaborate Buyer's Week program ever arranged during the 12 years history of the event when the gathering is held in Portland August 18 to 23.

This advice was issued from the Oregon metropolis today by the Executive Committee in charge of the twelfth annual meeting. The list of participants has been closed and a total of 135 jobbers and manufacturers will take part in the event.

This is the largest number of firms ever signed up to entertain the merchants and buyers of Portland's trade territory. The previous high mark in the number of participants was reached several years ago when 130 jobbers and manufacturers joined in organizing the reception and entertainment plans.

The list of participating firms takes in 25 lines of merchandise including everything from furniture to dry goods. The variety of merchandise which will be offered by these firms, thus will be more diversified than has ever before been possible.

Invitations for the week will be sent through the Western states, British Columbia, and Alaska, July 1, and every merchant in Portland's trade territory will receive full advice of the plans and program. Novel features for the entertainment of both men and women buyers will be listed.

Railroads of the west have issued a special rate for the week, this being equivalent to one and one-half of the one way fare for the round-trip. The usual feature of providing a refund of fare to all merchants and buyers purchasing \$500 or more worth of goods from participating firms during this week, will be available again this year.

GREATEST BIBLE PRINTING PLANT IN FAR EAST DESTROYED

The destruction by the Japanese earthquake of the Fukuin Press, the largest Christian publishing house in the Far East, was a loss to the whole Christian church.

Yokohama produced more scriptures for missionary purposes than any other city in the world and for the past thirty years practically all of these were printed by the Fukuin Press. The great bulk of scriptures for Japan, China, Siam and the Philippines and not a few for the far-away Malayasia states, were printed here.

In the early days of Christianity in Japan all printing was done by means of characters carved in wooden blocks. When it is recalled that a sign board near the home of a missionary read: "The evil Christian sect is strictly forbidden. If anyone is suspected of being an adherent, let it be known and a reward will be given," it is not surprising to learn that it was only by strategy that a man could be secured to work on these blocks and that he continued at his task only until he discovered that he was working on the Christian Bible.

The first Japanese New Testament was printed from metal plates in 1874. In 1866 the Presbyterian missionaries in Siam printed the first Siamese Bible.
