BOXING CONTESTS ARE REPORTED GOOD

Clark Johnson Wins in First Round and Gardeau Shows Usual Good Form

The fights at the armory Wednesday were all good bouts and none of them went the full time, each of them ending in a knockout. Features were the unusual knockout in the second bout, the quick work that Clark Johnson made of his fight, and the last and main event which went seven rounds of good fighting.

The first preliminary went to the end of the third round when Chet Bennett, 168 pounds, of Tillamook, knocked out Harry Johnson, 168 pounds, of Whitney camp, the tenth count coming just as the gong rang. This fight started rather tame with Bennett having slight edge in a good slug fest in the second and third round.

The second curtain raiser was scheduled to go four rounds, and promised to be a good fight since, these heavy weights had fought to a draw two months ago. But after two minutes and twenty-two seconds of hard punches, both huskies tore loose with their rights and both connected and sprawled on the canvas. Martin was able to get up, but Joe Johnson took the count. Johnson of Whitney camp weighed in at 173 1-2 and Geo. Martin of Portland, 184.

The first main event between Clark Johnson, 153 pounds of Tillamook, and Ted Burns, 164 pounds of Portland, went two minutes and forty-seven seconds of the ten-round bout that was to have been a tough fight, since it had taken Johnson seven rounds to kayo Burns, but the Tillamook boy had improved wonderfully since his fight in February, and had Burns on the ropes soon after the fight started, and made short work of it.

In the main bout, Billy Gardeau, of Tillamook, weighing 146 pounds, had a tough man to beat in Joe Serra of Seattle weighing in at 150 pounds. Although Gardeau had his man backing up most of the time the Seattle boy did some good fighting. He led in the first round, with Gardeau taking them easy in the body. Gardeau started leading in the second and in the third begun using both hands effectively. In the fourth Serra came back for more and landed several

good wallops that Gardeau usually returned. The fifth was another tough round with Gardeau off his feet twice but he finished strong. The sixth was easily Gardeau's round, but Serra proved to be awfully tough and stood up under a lot of punishment for Gardeau landed a lot of heavy artillery. Serra was on the ropes most of the two minutes and thirteen seconds of the seventh round and was so groggy at the end of that time that his manager threw in the towel. The fights were all fast and clean and showed a lot of good sportsmanship throughout. Harry Ditter was referee and Bert Mann announcer.

(Continued from page 1) mated that it will take about three months to finish the grading job.

In order to use the new road for next winter's travel it would be necessary to provide the new grade with a plank surface, and the county court this week expressed themselves as doubtful whether any funds were available in the county for this purpose. Private parties who are interested in the north end of the county may furnish necessary lumber for the temporary road.

The completion of this stretch will be a great convenience to the people of Brighton, Wheeler and Nehalem districts, who are now forced to travel the Foley creek road to get to Tillamook city.

LOCAL LUMBER COMPANY

The A. F. Coats lumber company which has been in the present location since 1913, has been running almost steadily since that time. The mill site is the oldest in the county, having been operated for at least thirty years. The present owners purchased the plant from the Tillamook lumber and manufacturing company who had taken it over from F. S. Whitehouse. About sixteen years ago the mill was destroyed by fire, but was rebuilt immediately. At present the company is producing an average of 85,000 feet per day, and employ over 100 men. In connection with the saw mill department, which saws and finishes all grades of fir, spruce and hemlock lumber, lath and shingle mills, dry kilns and planers are operated. Their camp about five miles south of town employs more than 100 men and keeps a constant supply of logs at the mill. Although the market for lumber is not altogether satisfactory, there are no immediate indications of being forced to close down. A burned out transformer has been the cause of a few days' delay this week.

PIONEER'S BIRTHDAY MARKED BY PARTY

A very pleasant and enjoyable social occasion was staged at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Tomlinson on Sunday June 22, in honor of "Grandpa" Tomlinson's 89th birthday. Twenty-seven relatives and friends were present and all did ample justice to the bounteous dinner, served picnic style in a shady nook near the farm house.

It was indeed a pleasure to help this sturdy pioneer celebrate his birthday and to see that pleased expression overspread his countenance as this sturdy pioneer celebrate his birthday cake bearing 89 candles and also the figures 89.

Samuel C. Tomlinson was born in Coal county, Missouri, June 20, 1835 and crossed the plains by ox-team in 1853, being on the road five months before he at last reached Oregon City. He later moved to the Waldo Hills section, and on July 5, 1857 married Miss Elizabeth White. They then moved to what is now West Salem where Mr. Tomlinson operated the Salem ferry until 1862. For the following nine years he resided at The Dalles. Then moved to Roseburg, later to Coquille, returning to Portland in 1879. We should have mentioned that Mr. Tomlinson resided for a time in Portland soon after coming to Oregon, and he tells us that at the time he resided there, there was only one street car and that same car was drawn by one horse, and that Portland's lighting system at that time consisted of a lantern up on a post, which as the evening shadows came on, was lighted by a torch.

What a vast change in the city of Portland as well as all Oregon Mr. Tomlinson has lived to see.

Sickness and death came to the Tomlinson house hold in 1883 taking as toll, Mrs. Tomlinson and their youngest child, so in the fall of that same year Mr. Tomlinson decided to try life in Tillamook county.

He and his children made the trip by team over the old Yamhill road, which in reality would be called a trail now, yet at that time it was the only road leading in to Tillamook.

Since then Mr. Tomlinson has resided for the most part in this county. He has weathered all the hardships incident to the western frontier, raised a family of nine children, and is still hale and hearty at the age of 89 with bright prospects of being able to celebrate several more birthdays.

Studebakers win first prizes for Economy and Endurance

Light-Six and Special-Six carry off honors in gruelling 1882-mile official run staged at El Paso, Texas

These records are official. The run was sanctioned by the Contest Board of the American Automobile association and conducted under rules approved by it.

The entire course was covered by officials, press representatives and "checkers" who required each driver to check his car in and out at predetermined "control points" each morning, noon and night. Penalties were assessed for every violation of the rules.
