FILM STAR AND DIRECTOR TO APPEAR IN PERSON

Coliseum Management Have Arranged for Leading Lady of "Chechahcos" July 17 and 18

Gladys Johnston, who is starring in the feature photoplay production "Chechahcos" that is scheduled to be shown at the Coliseum on July 17 and 18, will appear at the theater in person on those dates. This will be the first time that any local theater has been favored by a personal appearance of the star of the production to be shown. TWO HUNDRED ACRES OF GREEN TIMBER BLAZING

Kelso, Wash., July 10—Nearly 200 acres of green timber in sections 13 and 25, township 9 north, range 1 west, belonging to Ostrander Railway & Timber company and the Weyerhaeuser Timber company were swept by the forest fire that is raging east of Ostrander.

There is little possibility of checking the fire until rain falls, as the woods are abnormally dry. Considerable wind is blowing. No logging equipment of the Ostrander company has been burned. The fire danger is great, according to County Fire Warden Charles Newell, who was here Wednesday from the fire zone.
