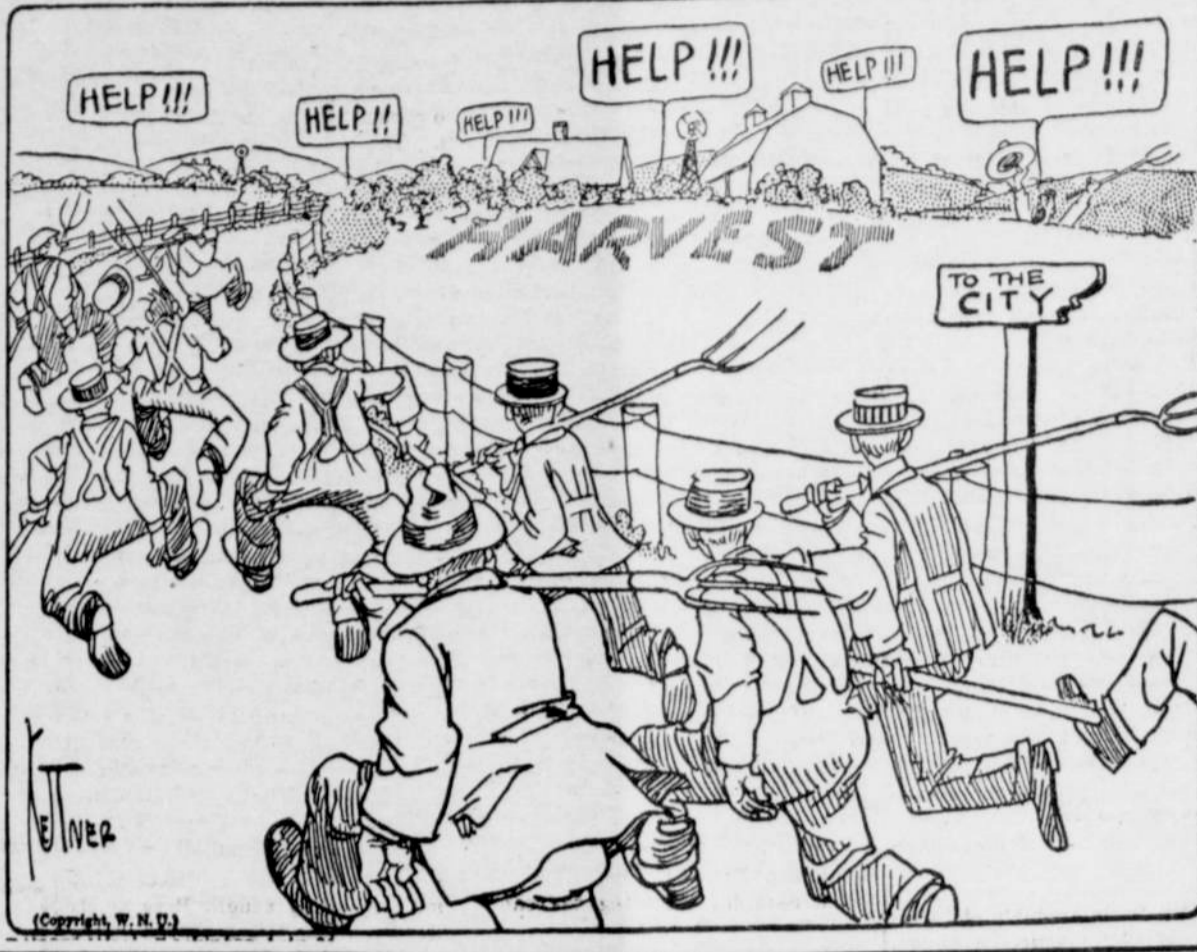

GIRL RECOVERS FOLLOWING OPERATION ON HER HEART

An operation on the human heart apparently successful in every way, and in which the organ was actually bared by the surgeon's knife, was described at the meeting of the American Surgical association in Baltimore recently by Dr. Elliott C. Cutler of Harvard Medical school, who performed it. He told of having inserted his finger in an orifice in the heart to cure a valvular disease and that the patient is still living, eleven months later, and improved.  
 Doctor Cutler said that the patient was a fourteen-year-old girl. One of the orifices of her heart was so small that it was impossible for the organ to function. The child was threatened with death because of this situation. The sack in which the heart is enclosed was opened. The organ itself was exposed. While it beat, the delicate operation of opening the orifice was performed. The sack was closed and the patient slowly recovered.

DELEGATES RETURN FROM CONVENTION

The Do-dads won all the games and as a prize, a Tillamook cheese was awarded the winning team. As a result of the activities of Rev. Harness and the other Tillamook delegates, quite a number of the Christian preachers are spending their vacation at our beaches this summer.

 Ronde and Foster's mill burned log-ged-off lands and probably did more good than damage, with the exception of burning several cords of pulp wood. Fires were evidently common over the coast. Areas effected were the Santiam district in Oregon, Skagit and Whatcom counties in Washington, with bad fires in the Spokane district. California sections near Mount Shasta and Sacramento river have entailed a considerable loss to national forests as well as to private owners. Several bad fires are reported to be raging near Vancouver, B. C., one of them causing a loss of 5,000,000 feet of timber. Some of these fires have been put under control but others are still burning. Locally, the shower Monday morning helped the fighters.  
 Fate was unkind to two boys in Clarke county Washington, when their pile of wood valued at about \$100 was burned. They had taken the job of cutting the wood to earn money to use in putting themselves through a collegiate course at Pacific University.

CHEESE NOTES

The Wisconsin cheese market continues to decline; the primary market at Plymouth Saturday having gone to 16 1-2 cents on daisies and 16 3-4 cents on longhorns. This is 4 1-4 cents lower on daisies and 5 1-2 cents lower on longhorns than a year ago. Wisconsin production continues very high since they have had considerable rains the last month.  
 Production in Tillamook was twenty four boxes less than a year ago for the first week in July. The production to July 1st was 55,909 boxes as against 50,312 boxes during the same period year—an increase of approximately ten percent.  
 Owing to the extreme prices prevailing on corn, oats, barley, and wheat, prices of feed advanced all along the line.
