TILLAMOOK WINS

Last Sunday at the fair grounds the Tillamook baseball team won a thrilling game from the undefeated Wheeler team. Wheeler led most of the way, breaking a scoreless tie in the second and third innings with two runs from hits and Tillamook errors. The local team tied the score in their half of the fifth when Campbell got to first on an error, Johnson walked and Mahan hit safely and the Wheeler team threw the ball all over the lot. Wheeler immediately forged ahead in the sixth with a two bagger by Garland when the ball curved away from Campbell in left field, singles by Young and Downey scoring two runs. In the seventh Fortier went in at shortstop, replacing Hamilton who took right field in place of Plasker. Fortier started Tillamook's half of the seventh with a single and a stolen base, scoring a run on Irvine's hit. Wheeler chalked up another in the eighth off a single and double by Garland and Young. With two down and the bases vacant, in the eighth King walked, Fortier, Campbell and Johnson hit, which, with the aid of an error gave Tillamook a one run lead scoring three runs in that inning. Ross of Wheeler started the ninth off with a hit and stole second, trying to score in Horton's single to left field, but Campbell recovered the single and made a perfect throw home that easily caught Ross at the plate. Horton scored on Tolford's two base hit, tying the score. In the last half of the ninth, with one down, Irvine walked and with a good lead off first base went to third on Hamilton's sacrifice and scored the winning run on a wild heave by Ross, the Wheeler pitcher.

Wheeler was handicapped by the absence of Anderson, their regular pitcher, but Ross let Tillamook down with only seven hits, while his team mates were able to chalk up thirteen off Johnson, Tillamook's pitcher, four of which were scratches, and three went for two bases. With one man on, Johnson whiffed three straight in the fourth. Both teams played steady ball with a few errors on each side.
