YOUNG MAN OF WHEELER DIES

William J. Anderson, age 26 years, of Wheeler died at the Boals hospital in this city Wednesday evening after a short illness of a complication of pulmonary diseases. He and his wife were living at Wheeler, where Mr. Anderson was working with the railroad company, at the time of his taking sick, Tuesday July 8. The young man is survived by his wife, mother, father, sister and brother, who live in Portland. He had spent 18 months in service over-seas in the engineering corps, and was a member of the Elks lodge at McMinnville. The funeral services will be held Saturday at the Holman undertaking parlors in Portland.

LITTLE TROUBLE EXPERIENCED IN AUTOMOBILE TOUR

The three ladies, Mrs. A. C. Everson, her daughter Areta and Miss Belle Wilson, who left Tillamook last month on a motor trip for Chicago arrived there on Monday, July 7. They were immediately directed to conveniently located apartments near the Gregg school of shorthand where the two younger ladies expect to attend the six weeks summer session, which commenced on the 14th. They had arrived in Chicago in sufficient time to look through portions of great merchantile establishments such as Marshall Fields company. The last few hundred miles of the trip was necessarily over detours through Iowa and Illinois. These extra miles were traveled in order to avoid the storm areas that were effected recently in that section. All the bad storms that did so much damage in the middle west were dodged by the Tillamookers, and through a detour between Grand Island and Omaha the only bad roads and mud were encountered. These extra miles brought the total mileage up to 2850. However, some of the side roads were in perfect condition and in south eastern Iowa and Illinois they found the roads well rocked and paved. The party averaged 240 miles per day on the last part of the trip in order to reach their destination on scheduled time. One pleasant feature brought about by the detouring was passing through Galesburg, Illinois, the old home of Mr. Everson, where the motorists visited acquaintances.

The trip had been made with very little car trouble, only one puncture having occurred. A total of 186 gallons of gas were consumed at a cost of about forty six dollars. Additional cost on the car amounted to thirty seven dollars. The party was equipped to camp on the way and most of the meals were taken in camp style. Over the mountain sections the temperature was a little too low to warrant comfortable camping out. In these areas they were accommodated at hotels. The trip was made about a month too early to get the best results from the auto camps along the way but no great inconvenience was experienced.

Letters to A. C. Everson state that the most enjoyable sight from the standpoint of cultivated landscape was seen while approaching Salt Lake City from this side. At this city the trio arrived in time to attend the noon

with its huge organ. The Mormons concert at the large Mormon temple for the stranger by obtaining displayed their reputable consideration seats for the visitors. At Chicago the ladies have attended the magnificent First Presbyterian church hearing an immense choir sing to a congregation that filled the auditorium. This congregation typified the extensive church-going habits that prevail in the middle west, where there are few beaches, mountain streams and so forth to attract the Sabbath day idler.

The trip as a whole was very enjoyable all the way, good luck, good weather and geniality being the chief elements that made it so.
