35 YEARS AGO Theo. Steinhilber, Editor.

July 26, 1889 Team loads of campers and land locators continue to arrive every day from the valley.

The North Yamhill livery stables are kept busy bringing in passengers to Tillamook.

There is no question but what a creamery will be in operation here next year.

The editors are anxious to get up their summer suits, or as much of them as they can. We therefore ask the subscribers to do the square act. Come forward at once and plank down the hard cash, so that we can lay in a supply.

Owing to the hard times our wardrobe will not be very extensive this season; however we hope to be able to purchase for cash a pair of striped homespun breeches and a linen duster each, a couple of straw hats at fifteen cents apiece, a celluloid collar, which will be worn by first one and then the other, two pairs of second-hand shoes, No. 11 and 13, and possibly a few minor articles of dress, which, if we could only purchase them, would relieve us of lots of embarrassment and add very much to our personal appearance.

July 27, 1899 Mr. C. N. Drew returned from The Dalles on Monday, where he had attended the Grand lodge of the A. O. U. W. He reports the weather swelling there.

"Play Ball" will be called tomorrow (Friday) afternoon at one o'clock in the game of baseball to be played between Tillamook City and Tillamook county officials.

Barnett, a cattle buyer, drove a herd of 500 yearling steers from this county to McMinnville last week and shipped them to North Yakma. They were, like all cattle raised in this county, in good condition.

The price of salmon on the Columbia river is away up. A Portland buyer of fish for the Portland markets telegraphed his agents at Astoria to pay 6 1-2 cents per pound for all fish over twenty-five pounds. The canneries are paying 5 1-2 cents.

RESIDENT OF ROCKAWAY DIES

Enoch J. Johnson of Rockaway, died suddenly at his home last Sunday. He had lived in the beach city for five years, having moved there from his former home at Longreach, West Virginia, where he was born November 9, 1856. He was well known by visitors who has patronized the bath house conducted by him. He is survived by his wife and two children. The business section of Rockaway was closed Monday afternoon

during the funeral which was held there. Reverend F. C. Reusser, of the Cloverdale Baptist church conducted the funeral services. Interment was held in Portland.

The largest steamer that even entered Tillamook bay is expected to arrive there Saturday from the south. The vessel is the Alvarado, 245 feet long, and is a Pacific coast product, having been built at Long Beach, Cal., in 1914. The ship is of 1994 tons gross. Russell Hawkins, manager of the Whitney Lumber company of Garibaldi, on Tillamook bay, returned from San Francisco where he went to charter the Alvarado. The steamer will take out about 1,200,000 feet of lumber, which has been manufactured at the Whitney mill from timber which grew on the Kilchis river. "The lumber business is looking up," said Mr. Hawkins at the Hotel Portland. "It is on its back and that is the only way it can look. There is considerable building in California and a good demand for lumber, but the prices are not what they have been." Mr. Hawkins says that there is an ocean of water in Tillamook bay, and the Alvarado will have no trouble on that score.—Oregonian.

CLEAN CAMP GROUNDS NEEDED ON McMINNVILLE-TILLAMOOK COAST HIGHWAY

It is the general opinion of those who travel the McMinnville-Tillamook highway that the time is opportune for the State Highway commission to set aside a number of camping places along the highway for the accommodation of tourists. More and more private owners of property are fencing in available camping spots. Signs should be posted at the camping spots requiring campers to exercise due efforts in keeping them clean by burning all refuse. The practice of throwing discarded cans or crabs behind logs within short distance of camping spots is neither sanitary nor conducive to the enjoyment of the pretty camping places. Such carelessness should not be tolerated. All refuse should be burned or buried by campers. The traffic officers who patrol the highways could police the camping spots without hindrance to their regular duties. The erection of adequate signs, even without the supervision of traffic officers will go a long way in keeping the camping spots clean. The putting out of all camp fire has been followed out splendidly by campers due to signs that have been posted and a general campaign of education. With a little attention directed to the matter of keeping the camp grounds clean and sanitary this problem may also be solved. The proposition should be called to the attention of the state

highway commission.— McMinnville News-Reporter.

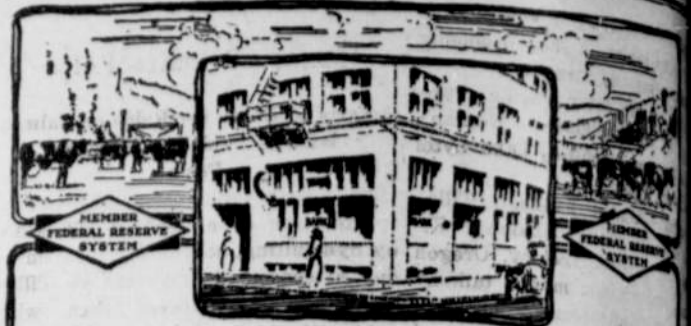
