**ANTLERED HERD HERE**

delivered the address of welcome. David Kuratli, Exalted Ruler of Tillamook lodge 1437, and Dr. J. G. Turner, Past-Exalted Ruler gave short talks on the advancements that had been made. H. T. Botts presented a message from the "Land of Cheese, Trees and Ocean Breeze." President Lonergan stated that since the Elks had been 6 years in perfecting their association, with 39 lodges of the state


consisting of 18,000 members, this is the first opportunity for them to effectively meet and the time was ripe for a progressive program to be launched in Tillamook.  
Some of the things they contemplating on their constructive program are: assistance to the Boy Scouts, who have proven themselves worthy of support of any adult organization; help establish a state Constitution Day for September 17, this being about the 81st birthday of Oregon as a state. This matter was presented by Robert W. Smith; appointment of a state parole officer for boys' and girls' state training schools was recommended by Frank D. Cohan, secretary of the association. The question of establishing a home for indigent Elks was discussed.  
It was announced that all delegates were requested to register on the mezanine floor of the Tillamook hotel.  
The program for Thursday and Saturday promises to be more attractive than ever, with just enough moisture having fallen to make the activities more enjoyable. Early this morning the clam digging excursion party left for its trip to the flats in the bay. At 9:30 a trap shooting tournament will be staged at the new fair grounds. This is to decide the state championship for Elks. First prize is a handsome trophy presented by the local lodge and is to be contested for until the team from one lodge has won it three years. The high gun prize is a beautiful trophy donated by Beckus and Morris, sporting goods dealers of Portland. Fifteen other prizes are donated by merchants of Tillamook, Portland and Tacoma.  
10 o'clock, convention meeting at Coliseum theater, and deep-sea fishing trip, caravan starting at court house, sight-seeing trip starting from Liberty school, special sight-seeing trip for ladies and airplane flights at Stillwell field.  
In the afternoon all Elks will stage a parade. For this event there will be good prizes donated to the lodge with largest proportional attendance, best decorated float, bathing girl, tallest Elk, shortest Elk, fattest Elk, oldest Elk, and best clown in parade.  
At 3 o'clock will be the rodeo at the old fair grounds, deep sea fishing trip, and at 5 band concerts. During this time the A. B. C. attractions and the airplane will be in progress.  
Friday evening the smoker at the armory starts at 7 o'clock, with Ralph Gruman referee. The card is: Billy Gardeau, Weiser, Idaho, versus Gene Urbaneck, Seattle, 155 pounds, 10 rounds; Clark Johnson, Tillamook versus Bert Tribby, Marshfield, 155 pounds, 10 rounds; Cracker Warren, Portland, versus Phil Bayes, Salem, 160 pounds; Tommy McCarty, Portland, 158 pounds, versus Lewis Johnson, Tillamook, 160 pounds, six rounds; Troy Hines versus Putt Mathews, 4 rounds; Hallowell kids, curtain raiser. Saturday morning's program will be a repetition and continuance of Friday morning's program with the exception of the sea food barbecue at noon at the fair grounds. This will be free to every one. At this time it is expected that 4,000 people will be served. 400 gallons of coffee will be prepared in a cheese vat, two 400 pound Tillamook cheeses that have been curing a year will be cut to accompany 20,000 Tillamook bay clams. 1000 pounds of dressed salmon and 9,000 buns. All of this feast excepting the coffee is made from Tillamook products.  
Saturday afternoon the thrilling motor cycle polo games will be staged, with the other regular attractions following. In the evening the grand closing dance with special features at the armory will follow the band concert by the Tillamook Elks band.  
Special invitations are extended to the visiting Elks to attend either the dedication of the Nehalem-Wheeler bridge or the celebration at Rock-away.
