

GAME LAWS MIXED BY LATE DECISION

A recent ruling by the Attorney General in a case fought in Salem makes all the changes in the hunting seasons made by the state game commission void. This throws the hunting seasons back to the old status as fixed by law.

GAME DISTRICT NO. 1
Comprising all Counties West of Summit of Cascade Mountains

Game Animals:
Male Deer with horns—open season from August 20 to October 20, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, two such deer during any open season.

Silver Gray Squirrels—Open season from September 15 to October 15, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, five of such squirrels in any seven consecutive days.

Game Birds:
Chinese Pheasants, Sooty or Blue Grouse, Ruffed Grouse or Native Pheasants, and Bob White Quail—Open season from October 15 to October 31, both dates inclusive; provided, however, that in Jackson, Josephine and Douglas counties the open season on Sooty or Blue Grouse shall be from September 1 to September 30, both dates inclusive.

Mountain or Plumed and California or Valley Quail—There shall be no open season except in Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry counties, where the open season shall be from October 1 to October 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, ten of such birds in any seven consecutive days.

Ducks, Geese, Rails, Coots, Wilson or Jacksnipe, and Greater or Lesser Yellowlegs—Open season from October 1 to January 15 of following year, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, twenty-five of such birds in any one day and not to exceed thirty in any seven consecutive days, except that bag limit on geese shall be eight in any one day and not to exceed thirty in any seven consecutive days.

GAME DISTRICT NO. 2
Comprising all Counties East of Summit of Cascade Mountains

Game Animals:
Male Deer with Horns—Open season from September 1 to October 31, both dates inclusive, except that in Wallowa and Union counties the open season shall be from September 1 to November 10, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, two of such deer during any open season.

Chinese Pheasants in Game District No. 2, except in Union, Umatilla, Baker, Grant, Malheur and Wallowa counties, where the open season shall be from the first Sunday in October to the second Sunday in October, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, five of such birds in any other day, or ten during any seven consecutive days;

provided, that not more than two female Chinese Pheasants may be killed in any seven consecutive days; provided, further that in Hood River and Wasco counties the open season shall be from November 1 to November 10, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, in Hood River and Wasco counties, same as for other counties in Game District No. 2 where there is an open season.

Sage Hens—Open season from August 1 to August 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, five of such birds in any one day, or ten during any seven consecutive days.

Prairie Chickens—Open season, in Wasco, Union and Sherman counties only, from October 1 to October 15, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, five such birds in any one day, or ten during seven consecutive days.

Blue or Sooty Grouse, Ruffed Grouse or Native Pheasants—Open season from September 1 to October 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, five of any or all of such birds in any one day, or ten during any seven consecutive days; provided, however, that in Union and Wallowa counties the open season shall be from September 1 to November 10, both dates inclusive.

Mountain or Plumed and California Valley Quail—Open season in Klamath county only, from October 1 to October 10, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, ten of such birds in any seven consecutive days.

Ducks, Geese, Rails, Coots, Wilson snipe or Jacksnipe, and Greater or Lesser Yellowlegs—Open season from September 16 to December 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, twenty-five of such birds in any one day, or thirty birds in any seven consecutive days, except that bag limit on geese shall be eight in any one day and not to exceed thirty in any seven consecutive days.

Ducks, Geese, Rails, Coots, Wilson snipe or Jacksnipe, and Greater or Lesser Yellowlegs—Open season from September 16 to December 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, twenty-five of such birds in any one day, or thirty birds in any seven consecutive days, except that bag limit on geese shall be eight in any one day and not to exceed thirty in any seven consecutive days.

Mountain or Plumed and California or Valley Quail—There shall be no open season except in Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry counties, where the open season shall be from October 1 to October 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, ten of such birds in any seven consecutive days.

Ducks, Geese, Rails, Coots, Wilson or Jacksnipe, and Greater or Lesser Yellowlegs—Open season from October 1 to January 15 of following year, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, twenty-five of such birds in any one day and not to exceed thirty in any seven consecutive days, except that bag limit on geese shall be eight in any one day and not to exceed thirty in any seven consecutive days.

GAME DISTRICT NO. 2
Comprising all Counties East of Summit of Cascade Mountains

Game Animals:
Male Deer with Horns—Open season from September 1 to October 31, both dates inclusive, except that in Wallowa and Union counties the open season shall be from September 1 to November 10, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, two of such deer during any open season.

Chinese Pheasants in Game District No. 2, except in Union, Umatilla, Baker, Grant, Malheur and Wallowa counties, where the open season shall be from the first Sunday in October to the second Sunday in October, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, five of such birds in any other day, or ten during any seven consecutive days;

A PROBLEM FOR THE RURAL COMMUNITY

School has begun. Approximately two-thirds of the young people between the ages of 5 and 20 who live in the open country or the small towns and villages have enrolled in school. Of this host of over 11,000,000 boys and girls, over 3,000,000 are in one-teacher schools.

The teachers of these 175,000 one-teacher rural schools have received the fewest number of weeks of professional training of any group of teachers. Nearly half of them, no doubt, are teaching with the smallest amount of preparation permitted by the law. Over one-fourth of them are teaching their first term of school. The majority of them are young; three or four years younger than town and village teachers. Moreover, their school terms are one or two months shorter than those of the latter group.

In view of these facts has the state complied with its obligation in public education? Have the rural boys and girls an equality of opportunity in education? Are they provided facilities for obtaining an education which are in any respect equal to those generally provided in larger centers of population?

The above inadequate conditions make imperative the attention and assistance of every local community to its rural school. Parents, as well
