Company K may have the opportunity to send one of its members to the United States Military academy at West Point. Word has been received by the company commander from Adjutant General White's office that an allotment of two cadships has been made to the Oregon National Guard, the selections to be made by the Governor of the state based upon the results of a competitive examination.

The competitive examination for 1924 is announced for Tuesday, November 26, beginning at 10 A. M. at the Board of Officers quarters, Multnomah County Armory, Portland.

The two highest competitors will be certified by Governor Pierce to take the entrance examinations prescribed by the Government and which begin March 3, 1925.

The following requirements must be met by all applicants: To be eligible for this examination an applicant must be an enlisted man of a unit recognized by the Federal Government. He must on the date of admission, July 1, 1925, have served as an enlisted man not less than one year; must be between the ages of 19 and 22 years, and must be not less than five feet four inches in height. No applicant shall be examined or recommended for examination who is deformed or afflicted with any disease or infirmity which would render him unfit for the military service, or who has, at the time of presenting himself, any disorder of an infectious or immoral character. Applicant must be unmarried.

Each company and similar unit is authorized to send one qualified candidate at state expense for the examination, provided that such candidate in addition to the Federal requirements enumerated in paragraph above, has attended not less than 60 percent of all drills and assemblies, including camp or field instruction, during the year 1924. Men so selected and who are required to leave

their home stations will receive transportation to and from home stations, commutation of rations at the rate of \$1.50 per day covering the period of actual travel from their proper home stations and subsistence and quarters while taking the examination. No expense is authorized in the case of candidates not required to leave home stations.

The mental examination will cover the following subjects: History—United States, General, Ancient, Medieval, and Modern; Language, Grammar, Composition, Literature, Algebra, Geometry.

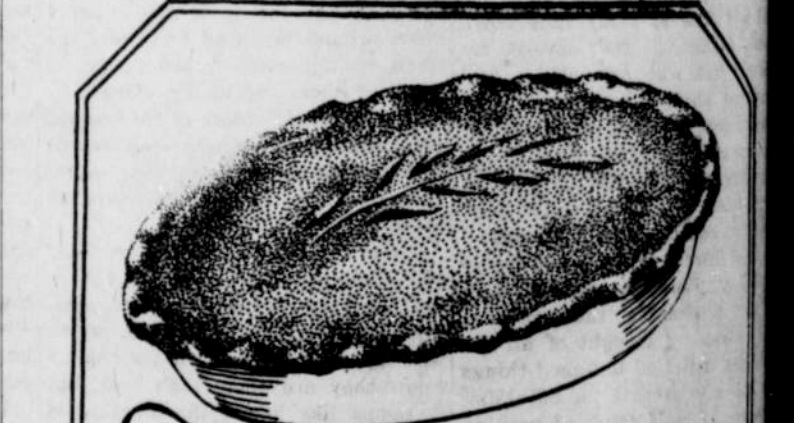

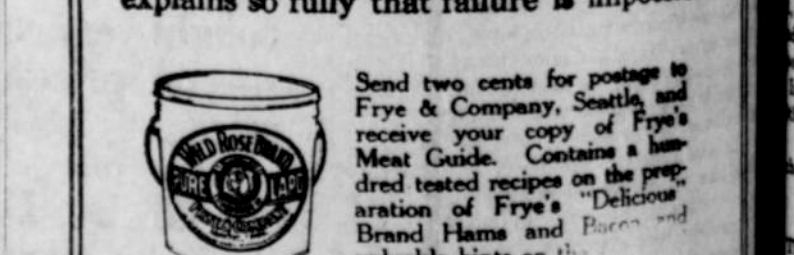

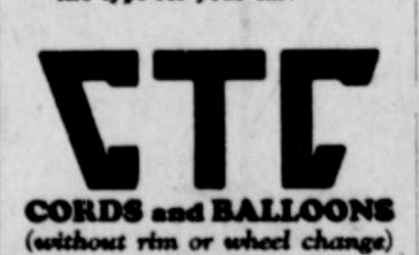
