planting, cultivating and digging. The bulbs which are mostly in demand are those of the tulip, hyacinth, daffodil, Dutch Iris, Easter lily and gladioli, though the first three named are considered the most profitable for cultivation here.

There is no danger of overproduction of bulbs, for experts have figured that it will take twenty years to work up the industry in this country to a place where the demand can be filled. Mrs. Darbee, who is a sister of Mr. Gooch, is largely responsible for the interest aroused along this line. Mrs. Darbee has been a florist since early

girlhood, and had by the time she was seventeen years old, earned enough money selling violets in San Francisco to make a trip to Europe. She has studied conditions in Holland very carefully, having made a trip last year for the express purpose of informing herself as to bulb growing conditions. Mrs. Darbee believes that this new industry will some day outrank the cheese industry in this county.
