Infantile Paralysis

Health Talks by H. L. Babb, D. C.

There are several cities in the Northwest reporting cases of Infantile Paralysis. Portland has but eight or nine cases and one has terminated seriously. There should be no particular uneasiness felt here at this time. However an understanding of this disease and a knowledge of its care may prove the "ounce of prevention."

Infantile Paralysis sometimes called Infantile Palsy or Acute Anterior poliomyelitis is an acute inflammation of the anterior horn of the gray matter of the spinal cord, characterized by fever, flaccid paralysis and atrophy. It is called Infantile because it most frequently occurs in children.

The disease begins suddenly, with spinal aching, malaise, and a fever of 100 to 102 degrees. The fever lasts from two to five days, during which time the skin is dry and hot, the tongue may be coated, the urine scanty and highly-colored, the bowels are constipated, occasionally there is diarrhoea, the appetite is poor, and vomiting may be present. Within a few days it will be noticed that the lower limbs or other parts are paralyzed depending upon what part of the spinal cord is involved.

If your child is sick the best thing to do is take him out of school and put him to bed for a week. If any further symptoms appear call a physician.—Adv.
