CHILD FIRE PREVENTION

If all the people of our country were to learn by heart the rules regarding fire prevention which Fire Commissioner Drennan of New York City, has suggested for memorization by the school children of that city, so that what these rules require becomes instinctive, we would see a material decrease in our \$500,000,000 annual fire loss.

The rules which the fire commissioner suggests do not ask for more than ordinary care. He suggests that matches be kept always in metal containers; he warns against throwing remnants of lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes away without seeing where they fall; he tells one not to try to start fires with kerosene, nor to go into dark closets, bedrooms or cellars with lighted candles or matches and not use lighted candles on Christmas trees; he further cautions against keeping gasoline, naphtha or benzine in the house, and ends the list of twenty-one rules with the commandment: "Do not look for gas leaks with a lighted match or candle."

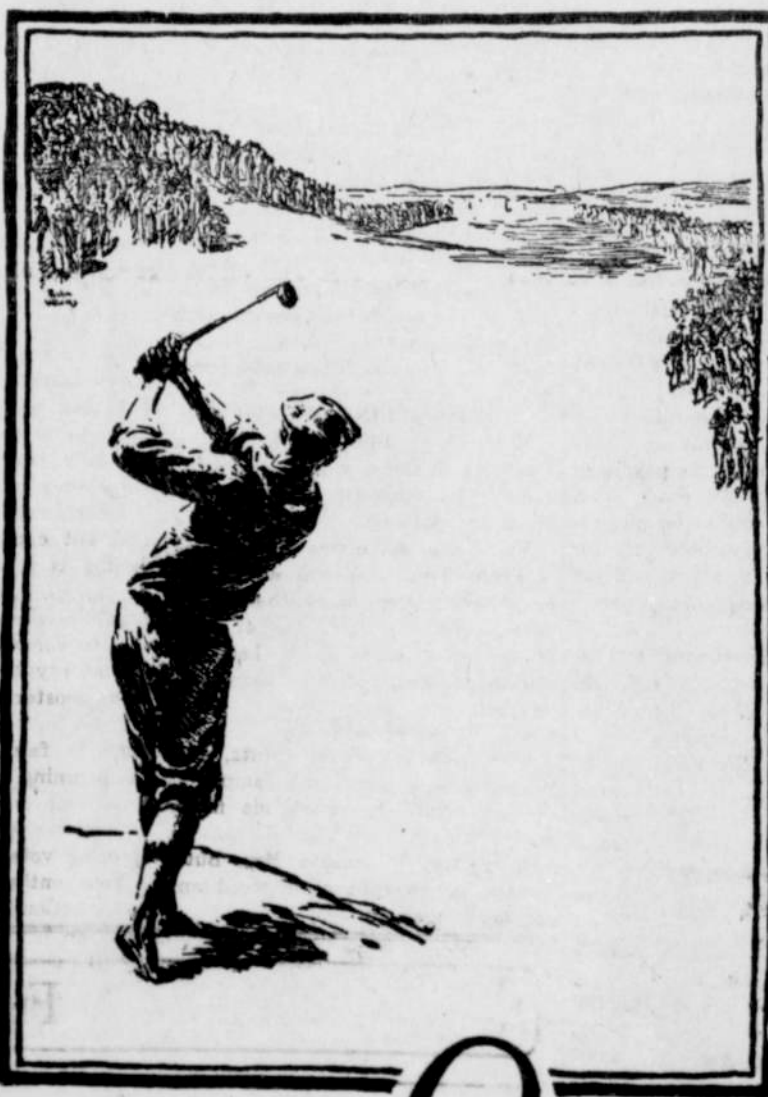
