WISCONSIN CHEESE FORCES PRICE DOWN

Heavy Decline in Eastern Product Causes Drop Here

LITTLE CHEESE STORED

Excessive Stocks of Butter Responsible for Low Price of That Product

The sensational decline of the Wisconsin cheese market during the past week will probably make it necessary to reduce the price of Tillamook cheese at least two cents, according to a statement made yesterday by Secretary Carl Haberlach. Wisconsin dairies dropped to seventeen cents and longhorns to seventeen and a quarter cents. At present quite a pile of the Tillamook cheese is in storage and with a differential of five cents to ten cents a pound over the Wisconsin primary markets, it means that Tillamook cheese cannot be sold. Production continues fairly high in the county and it would be taking a large chance to hold stocks back. Wisconsin prices are seven cents under last year, while Tillamook prices are four cents lower on triplets and less than a year ago.

Owing to the low price of butter, which is due to the excessive stocks held throughout the country, many dairies have gone to making cheese and seem to be willing to sell at from seventeen to nineteen cents a pound. It is impossible, states Mr. Haberlach, to obtain such an average now exists for Tillamook cheese and move sufficient quantities to keep the output cleaned up.

ELECTRIC STORMS DO DAMAGE HERE

Transformer and Telephone Lines Suffer From Disturbance

HIGH WATER TROUBLES

New Piping for City Mains Broken in Several Places by Flood Water

The severe southwesterly storm which has prevailed throughout the coast region the past few days did considerable damage in Tillamook county.

Lightning and thunder, which are very unusual in this section of the country, came at frequent intervals Monday and Tuesday, the lightning striking in several places with disastrous results. Three transformers of the Coast Power company were blown out and in the C. J. Edwards and Carl Haberlach residences the panel boards containing the electrical fuses were burned out. Fuses in some of the telephones in the city were also burned out.

Lightning which struck at Brighton on Monday broke the glass show cases in one of the stores.

The streams throughout the county are swollen and it is reported that water covered the roads at Happy Camp and Barview Tuesday, and on Wednesday one approach to the Tillamook river bridge was under water.

The new water mains being laid by the water commission were lifted out of the ditches by the high water for a distance of about three quarters of a mile. Due to a delay in shipping the valves which are to be placed at intervals along the mains, the pipes had not been covered though they have been laid for some time. One portion of the new main, which has been connected with the present main above the Goynes place on South Prairie, was filled with water to allow the pipe to swell and tighten. When the water raised the empty pipe it opened the valve and allowed more water to fill the ditch with the result that the pipe was all floated out and will have to be relaid when the water recedes.

The toll line of the Pacific Telephone company to Portland was out all day Wednesday except for a short time in the afternoon. As the company had a crew of ten men here who have been assisting in the enlargement of the plant, they were able to get the lines up in a short while and resume service. The lines to Nehalem and Bay City were also out for a short while.

VAUDEVILLE TROUPE COMING

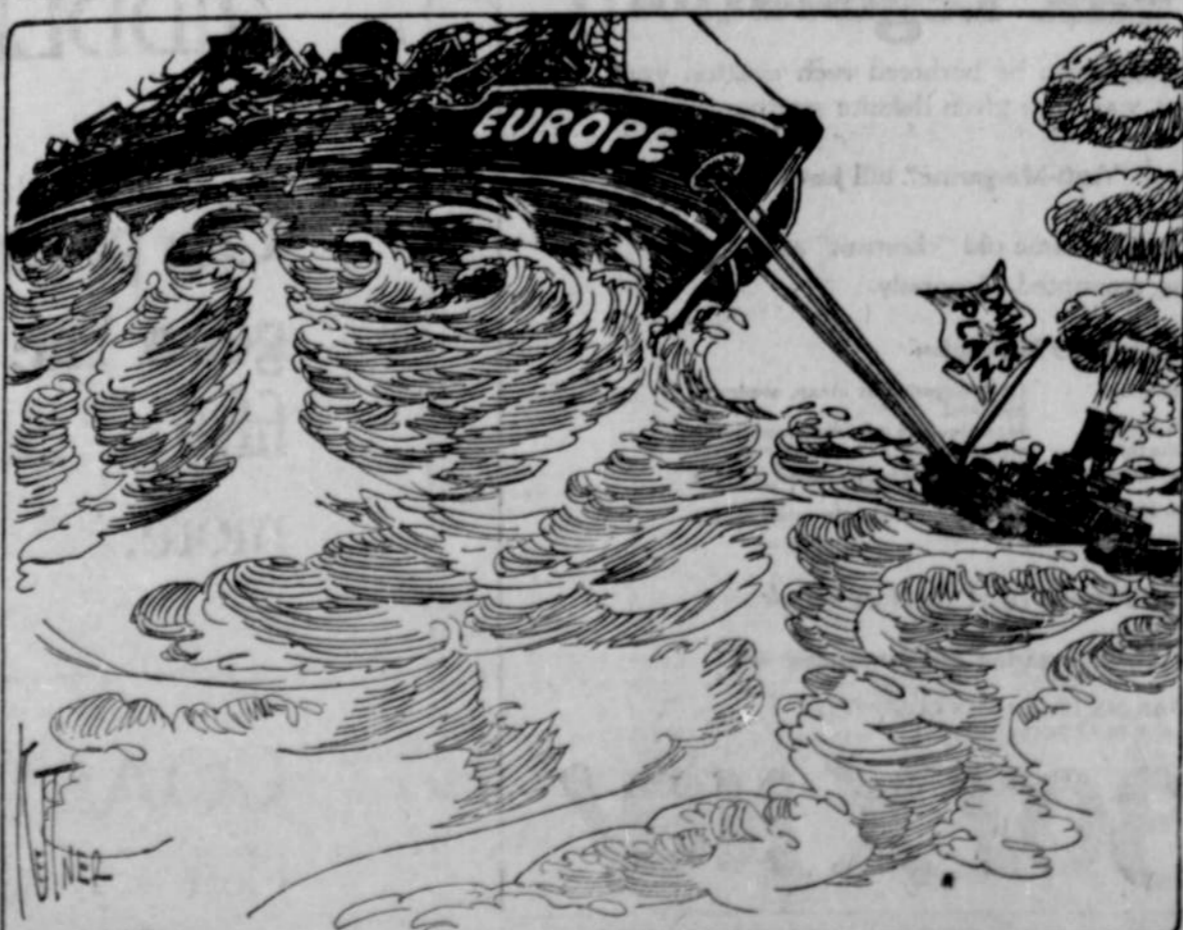
