GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP MEANS LOSS OF TAXES IN TILLAMOOK COUNTY

Portland, Oregon (Special)—Tillamook county voters have reason to know that alienation of county property by the government means increased taxes on all property that remains, according to I. L. Patterson, chairman of the republican state central committee, in discussing the La Follette proposal for government ownership of railroads. Mr. Patterson said the effect of this policy would be to increase taxes on other property in Tillamook county since the burden now borne by the railroads would be added to the tax bills of other property owners.

Tillamook county can recall its experience with the Oregon-California

land grant to realize just what shifting of title of property within the county to the government means. From the time the tax payments on the O. and C. land grant ceased in 1916, to 1923 inclusive, there was a loss in taxes in Tillamook county of \$35,699. This amount was, of course, assessed against remaining property and was paid by it, for the government pays no taxes on its land grant.

Of Tillamook county's taxes in 1923, amounting to \$821,355, the railroads paid 6 per cent. If the La Follette plan of government ownership should prevail, railroad property would be cut from the tax rolls, leaving Tillamook county people to add 6 per cent to their own taxes to make up the deficit.

But, Chairman Patterson points out, this would by no means be all the added taxation that the La Follette program in regard to the railroads would bring about. If the government takes over the railroads of the United States, it would mean a bond issue of upwards of \$20,590,000,000 in order to purchase the property. This means practically doubling the present National debt, with further heavy taxes to pay interest and sinking fund on this huge obligation.

This might not be altogether bad if this revolutionary step assured us either lower rates or better service. But our former experience with government control of railroads during that experiment we had the worst service ever known and highest rates.

It was government operation that brought us the high freight rates that the farmer now complains of. The cost of operation was so staggering that we have not yet recovered from it, and it appears we shall continue to pay this bill for years to come.
