MAURICE DUMESNIL
coming of Maurice Dunesnil,
noted French pianist, to Tilla-
mook under the auspices of the Mon-
day Musical club should be greeted
with the keenest delight. While Mr.
Dumesnil is quite unknown so far as
Tillamook goes, in the pianistic world, he
is one of the best. The French
pianist has enjoyed distinction in
France, Spain, England and
throughout South America. He has been
called a "modernist" but not to the
detriment of the classics. He plays
Chopin delightfully, and is
highly admired for his interpretation
of the works of the great
French composers and
also owes him a debt of grati-
tude for bringing forth the works of
Spanish composers and giv-
ing their works a high place in the
pianistic world.
Maurice Dumesnil is not altogether a
stranger in America. He has made
many appearances in New York
City and has been well received. His recital
in this city will be somewhat novel,
as Mr. Dumesnil never fails
to present something new.
