#### EPISCOPAL CHURCH ANNOUNCES NEW VICAR

The local congregation of St. Albans church, Episcopal is rejoicing in the appointment of a new clergyman to head their work. The Rev. Thos. Jenkins, D. D., new rector of St. Davids Parish, Portland, has resigned his present position to take up this new work. Dr. Jenkins was born in England, coming to this country as a boy, and settling in Ohio where he received his education. He is a graduate of Kenyon College, a church school located in Ohio, and of Bexley Hall, the theological seminary connected with this college. He was ordained deacon in 1900 and priest in 1901 by Bishop Vincent of Southern Ohio. For many years he was a missionary in Alaska, and was regarded as one of the outstanding missionaries of the church. His work in Portland has been unusually successful, especially along educational lines. He found a church school of 100 and leaves one of 400. He has established three chapels in outlying districts of the parish to look after the religious education of the children who cannot get to the mother church. For several years past, he has been chairman of the standing committee of the diocese of Oregon, one of the most honored positions in the jurisdiction. Last summer, his alma mater, Bexley Hall, conferred upon him the degree of doctor of divinity. Dr. Jenkins is to bear the title of general missionary and educational secretary. He will live at McMinnville, and look after that place, Hillsboro and Tillamook. He will also head the work of religious education of the diocese. He will assume his new duties at the beginning of the year.

#### MAURICE DUMESNIL

When the famous French pianist, Maurice Dumesnil, visits Tillamook on the evening of November 24, if

there is any place of interest to be seen, he certainly will have his notebook ready. Places of interest, new people, manners, customs and costumes, have long been his hobby. He always asks about the folk lore of the county or country-side, the traditions of the people and the history of the town. His note books comprise many people and many countries. They are all numbered and dated. A list of the leading people, the industries and all important happenings, such as the date it was founded, etc., are never left out. In that way, he says, he often finds it helps to build his program. What will do in one city will not do in another, and that is a very essential fact to fully appreciate. There is hardly a civilized country in the world he has not visited. He has learned much about the people, and their government. He can talk intelligently of the history of the country and what they are accustomed to.

As a lecturer Mr. Dumesnil is an interesting talker. He brings to his hearers people as he finds them. The same thing can be said regarding his playing. No matter from what composer he interprets, he has studied the people from that composer time and habitation and he brings out their natural characteristics.

As a pianist Maurice Dumesnil ranks among the best. From all parts of Europe to all parts of South America, the noted Frenchman holds a high place among musicians. Some critics claim him the most modern exponent of the keyboard without being an extremist. He plays nothing that is not true music and while his program consists of works of unknown composers upon analysis the true musician will find that Mr. Dumesnil shows keen insight in judging the works of unknown writers. He could be called a discoverer of new composers.

When Mr. Dumesnil appears in this city Monday evening under the auspices of the Monday Musical club, students and lovers of music can look forward to hearing something new and novel.
