MODERN HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

As one travels over the hard surfaced highways in a state like California he is impressed with the difference between the roads built from five to ten years ago and modern trend in road construction.

The old road, from 18 to 20 feet wide, is being replaced by roads where the grading runs almost from fence to fence on either side of the highway.

This requires no more work than digging ditches along the sides of the road as in the past and it adds immeasurably to the safety of the highways. It makes them virtually the width of a city street as on either side of the paved strip in the center

there is plenty of room for one or more cars to pass.

In other words, highways are being widened out sufficiently so that five or six cars may stand abreast. This eliminates, to a large extent, the danger of accidents from passing vehicles.

A second feature that one observes is the tendency to build shoulders, some two feet wide on each side of old pavements and cover the space in between with a new surface of asphaltic concrete. Thus is the old paving base salvaged by a new shock absorbing cushion which will withstand the impact of modern traffic.

Western states are leading the way in these new methods of road construction which include widening the whole grade and strengthening and widening old pavements in the manner indicated.

TAX REDUCTION IN OREGON

Oregon is making a little progress in lowering tax levies in a few cities and counties but indications are that Portland and Multnomah county will increase their tax levies as usual.

In place of abolishing boards and commissions and an expensive unyielding state government, the last legislature enacted new tax burdens in the way of a state income tax and many new additions to the state overhead.

The Oregon governmental machine broke all promises of giving the people a better system and a less expensive government and enacted a state income tax equal to 50 per cent of the federal income tax, the only western state to adopt this plan.

Compared with Washington, a similar state in all respects, Oregon political leaders do not make a flattering showing when contrasted with that state, where population has increased three times and assessed valuation 2 1-2 times in 24 years.

SOME INTERESTING FACTS

About \$2 is received by the grower for the wool that goes into a \$60 all-wool suit of clothes.

About 15 million is the average number of bananas consumed daily in the United States.

Georgia raised and marketed 30 million pounds of tobacco during the season just closed, which brought an average of 21.82 cents, putting more than six-million dollars into the pockets of the farmers.

An average of nearly 600,000 dozen eggs are consumed in New York city every day, or about one for each person.

A modern threshing machine can do as much work in a day as could be done by fifty men with the flail or former days.

It has recently been estimated that while the farmers of the United States receive only about seven and a half billion dollars for their year's crop, the consumers pay about twenty-two billion for the same products.

Prize money for the great poultry show at Allentown, Pa., this fall amounts to \$13,260.50, said to be more money than ever before offered by a similar exhibition.

British engineers have begun building a dam across the Indus river in India, which is designed to irrigate six million acres of land now mostly desert.
