

SETTLEMENT OF TILLAMOOK COUNTY

(Continued from page 3) After the keel was laid and stern posts and transom beam were bolted fast, it began to take a little more encouraging to those who had never seen a vessel of iron to make our spikes to hold down all the planking, and also bolts to fasten her frames together and bolt them fast to the keel. We had in fact to make every spike bolt required except where copper nails could be used. We also had to cut wood and turn it into charcoal of which we required quite a quantity, for you must know, we had found iron rods just the size wanted for bolts, and therefore had to hammer or draw out to the required length, and it took lots of sweat and muscle to do all this. We learned that some time between the years of 1843 and 1846 (the exact year I never knew) a U. S. sloop of war was wrecked on the Columbia bar, her name was, I think, the Herdeck and parts of her drifted down to Arch Cape, at the north west corner of Tillamook County and there came ashore. We therefore knew there would be plenty of iron at that place, so Mr. Thomas and myself started with four horses to Arch Cape, via Carney mountain and got through all right. On the part of the deck which came ashore here, was two guns, one was of about a nine pounder, they were covered over with sand (I have seen the date mentioned on the gun, but it is oftener covered with sand than not, I have never seen of the guns being removed). The people of Clatsop came down, cut the piece of wreck into pieces, burnt the wood and got all the copper bolts which she was fastened together. We found a great quantity of iron which held her deck fast to the ribs, were piled up on the side of the creek by the side of a hemlock tree, (some of them are there to this

day). This place formed our base of supply for iron. None perhaps who have traveled this route can possibly form some idea of the difficulty we had in packing this kind of material here. The trail at that time was much further down the mountain, in fact nearly on the edge of the bluff, and it was a difficult thing to make such a pack stay on the saddle. Had we been old packers we might have been able to have made up our packs to greater advantage, but what we lacked in experience, we had to make up in practice, and I assure you we had lots of practice before we got through with it. I do not think I shall ever forget the first load of iron we packed over. We had adjusted our loads several times before we arrived at Carney mountain, Thomas was a little ahead of me leading one horse and driving another before him. I followed leading one horse and driving another ahead, when passing along a very narrow place on the trail and very near the edge of the bluff, the pack on the horse I was leading, loosened by the cinch breaking and down came the pack which swung under the horse. This caused him to snort and jump around which scared the other horse and we had a circus for few minutes. Mr. Thomas had just got over this narrow part of the trail, and he left his horse and came back just in time to save the horse from going over the precipice into the ocean. The horses' hind legs were off the trail and I was holding the halter and pulling him with all my strength. Thomas cut loose the pack and helped the horse to get back on the trail, and there he stood and trembled like an aspen leaf, the sweat dropping off him almost in a stream. We got him cooled down and calmed, and then carried his pack to where the other horses stood and then packed him once again. We reached the Nehalem river without any further mishaps. Here we had to ferry across with the assistance of some Indians who came on with us to the mouth of Tillamook bay (Garibaldi). We sent our iron home in a canoe and went home with the horses. Before we made our second trip for iron, we made four good pack saddles which were far better than our riding saddles, which we used on our first trip.
