Painting Turkey's Legs. Among the many trades which exist, but which are not as a rule filled up to the census takers, are the "fakers" of all kinds.

Perhaps the most curious form of "faking" is that which deals with turkeys, dead or alive, and which is principally practiced in France.

It will then, to all appearance, have renewed its youth, and its owner is able to obtain a much higher price.

The freshness of the dead birds is also largely told by the color of the legs, and for this purpose a varnish is used.
