Emma Drake, M. D., who is at present working in the interest of the Portland Rescue Mission is in our city, meeting the people and making some splendid talks along lines that should be of interest to the parents and young folks. These who have not heard her should not fail to take advantage of the remaining opportunities.

Recently the pope of Rome asked the great powers to wrest Palestine forever from Turkish domination or else to guarantee permanent sanctity to holy places and protection to Christian pilgrims. The anti-papal newspapers of Italy have taken up the cry, and are advocating the creation of Palestine into a permanent and independent temporal kingdom for the pope. Such a plan was put forward many years ago as a final solution of the differences between the Vatican and the Quirinal.

Congressman Warburton, of the state of Washington, has a scheme to make the tobacco users build good roads throughout the country. He has introduced a bill to that effect. The plan contemplates trunk lines connecting the capitals of the different states with the national capital at Washington and with each other and running to the different national parks. The cost of construction is to be paid out of a tax similar to that of 1879 on tobacco. It calculated that the tax will raise \$80,000,000 a year.

The schooner Patsy of the Elmore line arrived in port the first of the week with a full capacity cargo of merchandise, returning after a day's stay, to Portland. Mr. Lamb, the company's agent here, states that as long as the Patsy is patronized sufficiently it will stay on the run, but that it will not play a losing game any longer. That is the whole thing in a nut shell. It simply means that if we are to retain competition in freight rates we must give the Elmore line a reasonable share of our business.

House Bill No. 55 by Gill of Clackamas which makes the possession of a federal liquor license prima facie evidence of selling liquor was recently passed by the House by but one dissenting vote. It increases the amount of fines for bootlegging, \$500 being the maximum, for the violation of the act, and adds a prison penalty of from 60 days to six months. The present law did not have a prison penalty. This law will better enable the state authorities and Uncle Sam to work in conjunction in the matter of disposing of the bootlegger.

Here is a fact of tremendous significance bearing upon the subject of prohibition. Two of the most conspicuous prohibition states in the Union are Kansas and Oklahoma, which are neighbors. Kansas, the oldest "dry" state in the west, has a penitentiary, located at Lansing, left over from the days when the state was "wet" and therefore had use for such an institution. But the present "dry" regime does not produce inmates enough to fill the Kansas penitentiary; and so that commonwealth, with commendable thrift, rents out her penitentiary facilities to her neighbor, Oklahoma, which, being born "dry", did not have use enough for a state prison to warrant the building of one. The state convicts of Oklahoma are thus accommodated in the Kansas penitentiary, these two states together barely furnishing enough prisoners to stock one respectable sized institution, where most states of like size have two or three apiece. These facts, incidentally mentioned in Harper's Weekly, furnish a pretty good temperance lecture, don't they?

The John D. Rockefeller, Jr., investigating bureau which has been delving into the social evil of the country reports that in New York City alone an annual income of \$27,000,000 is made from the services of 26,000 scarlet women, 90 per cent of whom have been ensnared and forced into this life of slavery. The statement is also made that the white slave business is on the increase throughout the country. Unfortunately, through the increased prosperity of our country, wealth in too numerous cases is placed in the hands of unscrupulous men who

are willing to pay any price that their base natures may be satisfied. This has brought into existence an organized band of devilish men who have built up the white slave traffic in an endeavor to satisfy the desires of the first and reap big rewards. Wealth on the one hand and the desire for it on the other is at the bottom of the whole business. The question now presents itself: Can our nation withstand its present and ever increasing prosperity? The greatest warfare of the ages is now on. We believe that on the whole the world is getting better, still, there are some mighty hard battles yet to be fought.

### HIGH PRICES AND HIGHWAYS.

Poor Highways contribute to the high price of farm produce to the consumer, for the transportation charges to enter into the ultimate cost of every article of food produced on the American farm. The influence of roads on prices reflects not only upon the man who raises the product and transports it to market, but on the consumer as well. This is one reason why highway improvement has become state and national issue, says Farm and Home. It is one reason why country roads should be constructed and maintained out of the general funds of the public instead of by assessment against adjoining property or from strictly local sources.

The average cost per ton per mile for transporting goods on American highways is 23 cents; in France and other European countries it costs 9 to 11 cents. The greatest obstacle to highway improvement in many states is the manner in which public money has frequently been expended, and the fear that large sums will be spent without securing adequate permanent results. Whenever the American taxpayer has reasonable assurance that public funds will be efficiently expended he shows an increasing willingness to be taxed.

### W. C. T. U. COLUMN.

Under the head of the department of Christian Citizenship the following questions will be answered at the next meeting of the W. C. T. U. The place and time of the meeting next week will be announced at the churches on Sunday as there are previously no more issues of the city papers.

For what purposes are laws enacted? For the protection of public morals, public health and public safety.

What is the intent of an ideal prohibitory law?

To protect the people from the manufacture, sale or giving away of any beverage containing alcohol.

What is the intent of an ideal license law?

To permit the manufacture, sale or giving away of alcoholic beverages, if certain conditions are complied with and some prohibitions and restrictions are obeyed.

Is it possible to have local prohibition in your state under existing laws? If so, how?

What power does the Initiative, Referendum and Recall give the people? Name the kinds of prohibitory laws, Statutory and Constitutional.

How can a statutory law be secured? By an act of the legislature, or by a petition by the people under the initiative, and voted upon by the people.

How can unconstitutional law be obtained? The amendment may be submitted by the legislature or by the people under the initiative, in either case it is voted upon by the people.

Why is constitutional law better than statutory? A statutory law may be amended or repealed at any session of the legislature unless it was submitted by the people under the initiative. An amendment to the constitution can only be changed by vote of the people.

What reasons are given for licensing saloons? What business interests are benefited by the legalized saloon? Have you a State Board of Control for your State institutions? Indeterminate sentence, probation and parole laws?

How many and what harness must a retailer of intoxicating beverages have? What protection is a United States tax receipt (internal revenue)? State license? County license?

What is the license fee for the State, County, Municipality? What officials have power to grant licenses in the State, County, Municipality? When are officials obliged to grant licenses?

How must city ordinances compare with State laws? City ordinances can never be weaker than state laws, but may be stronger, even to prohibition. Judges, Justices of the Peace, Police Magistrates or Prosecuting Attorneys cannot change constitutional, statutory or municipal laws.

How can state laws be changed? City ordinances? Whose duty is it to prosecute violators of the United States revenue laws? State laws? City ordinances? What oath does every official take? What is included in the oath which is required of every attorney and counselor of law, when entering his profession?


