COUNTY COURT MAKES TRIP OUTSIDE.

This morning Judge Mason and Commissioners Farmer and Edner left for Portland and other outside points for the purpose of investigating hard surface roads.

Bids will soon be received for 400 feet of hard surface road east from the pavement on Third Street to join the county road already constructed and for 2000 feet from the pavement on Second Avenue East north of the railroad track.

The investigation is being made so that the court will be in a position to act intelligently when the bids are received, and for the purpose of getting other information in regard to road building.

Contractor Wm. Roy who is building the new Christian Church, accompanied by Rev. Jope and Attorney Bott made a trip to Portland today for the purpose of securing some decorations for the new church building.

COMMERCIAL CLUB EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETS.

On Monday evening the executive board of the Commercial Club met and transacted the following business:

Motion was made and carried that transients who might remain in our city for a short time could have the use of the club rooms by paying their monthly dues of \$1.50 in advance.

It was decided that where delinquents were in arrears \$12.00 or over, they should be allowed to regain their good standing in the club by paying the present emergency initiation fee of \$10.00 and a months dues of \$1.50 in advance.

It was also decided that a rental of \$10.00 a night should be charged for all parties or institutions that might want to rent the hall.

A motion was made and carried to the effect that from date, the chairs or other furniture or property of the club should not be loaned to anyone under any circumstances, and that it was the desire of the club that all property at present loaned out by the club should be returned at once.

The board passed a resolution inviting the Federation of Boys Clubs of Oregon to hold its annual meeting here next fall. If the boys accept this invitation they will probably be entertained by the churches and citizens in general. However it was thought well to let an invitation be sent by the club. The convention will be attended by 250 boys.

The applications for fourteen new members were acted upon and accepted. This makes 21 new members who have joined the club since the present campaign for new members was inaugurated.

COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Tillamook County convention convened Saturday morning at 10:00 a. m. in the U. B. Church.

C. H. Phipps, State Sunday School secretary, and Dr. J. V. Milligan, an eminent Sunday School worker, were present.

Convention opened by song and prayer by pastor, I. E. Meese. In the absence of all the county officers, Secy. Phipps conducted a round table which was instructive and helpful; here questions were referred to as found on leaflet and answered by the secretary.

Dr. J. V. Milligan then addressed the convention on "Teacher's Training." Here are a few kernels:

Teaching in the public schools is not even so far reaching as in Sunday Schools, for we not only bring the children to understand the word, but lead them to Him for whom the word stands.

Many are not only defective in their training to teach, but defective in their understanding of the word they are to teach.

I believe the time is coming when we will give more time to teaching than the limit we now give.

You must begin to teach the child where you find him in his understanding.

You must teach the things that are teachable to the particular individual in the place where you find him.

To know how to teach is to know how to adapt the truth to the special class we teach.

2:30 p. m., song, Prayer by Rev. Kuhlman. Rev. C. H. Phipps spoke on the subject "A Graded School."

While this subject is not new in theory and to some extent in practice, yet it was seen after this discussion that as a general thing, few schools are up to the standard, not so because outlined by the secretary, but viewing from a common sense standpoint. He divided the school into three divisions - Elementary, from beginning to 13 years; Secondary, 13 to 20; Adult, 20 on. These divisions were then subdivided. The secretary covered a wide scope in his remarks.

J. V. Milligan then spoke on "Graded Lessons."

Why graded lessons? Ist, For "Evangelization," dealing with the individual at every period of life, hence 2d, "Individuality." Going from birth to death we have the following periods: 1-5 years, sense; 6-8 years, social; 9-12 years, individual; 13-16 years, social select groups; 17-20 years, co-ordinating.

Secy. Phipps then spoke on men's organized classes, of which Oregon has 100. Here we must refrain from further note for want of space.

7:30 p. m. After the opening service Secretary C. H. Phipps addressed a small audience on the subject of "Seven Sunday School Symptoms." Knowledge, Vision, Responsibility, Love, Friendship, Prayer and Service. We only wish that everybody could have heard this address, but we dare not say more upon the subject.

Sunday morning each church had the regular service.

At 3:00 p. m. Dr. Emma Drake, now representing the Louise House of Portland, addressed the ladies at the Church of Christ and Rev. Phipps the men at the M. E. Church.

On Monday afternoon she spoke at the Fairview school and on Monday evening at the Fairview Grange hall. Her last meeting was held this afternoon at the M. E. Church before the W. C. T. U.
