## INCUBATOR VS. HEN HATCHING EXPERIMENT.

An experiment to determine whether the incubator will hatch as many chicks from a given number of eggs as a good sitting hen, and whether incubator chicks will be as strong in vitality, has been begun by some members of the Oregon Agricultural Experiment League, composed of farmers interested in working out, in cooperation with the extension division of the Oregon Agricultural College, problems along many lines.

The records to be kept in this poultry experiment, No. 292, will show the number of eggs set, the number infertile, the number of chicks hatched, and the number of chicks dead in the shell. To show the relative vitality of the chicks hatched by the two methods, a record of the chicks that die should be kept. To make the test more accurate, some incubator chicks should be put with hen hatched chicks under hens to brood, and also some hen hatched chicks should be put with incubator chicks in brooders, and mortality records of both kept for four weeks.

At least three good sitting hens and one incubator should be used, set at the same time with the same kind of eggs. The care and fairness with which the eggs are selected will influence the accuracy of results largely, as eggs vary greatly in hatching qualities.

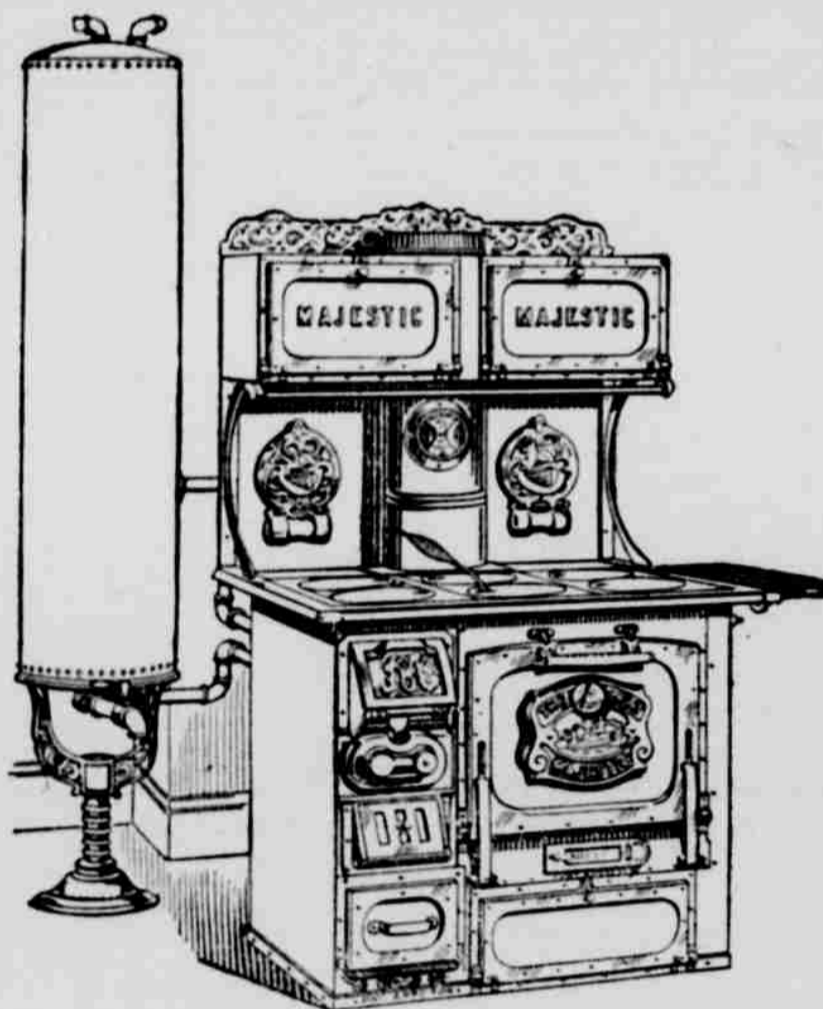

## COMMUNICATION.

Editor Herald:  
The Headlight still continues its attempts to discredit those who are making honest efforts to disclose whether or not this city and its property owners have been justly dealt with by the Warren Construction Co., and others. The attitude of the Headlight in the matter is in keeping with its usual inconsistency, unfairness and stupidity. It has upheld certain city officials in their attempt to arbitrarily fasten liens onto individual property in this city in sums ranging from \$200.00 to \$12,000.00. This attempt was made without the slightest effort being made on the part of the officials referred to to sample the paving and take such other precautions as ordinary care and prudence would demand. Pause and consider: Incurring an indebtedness of between two and three hundred thousand dollars against this town of only 1352 population without knowing whether you were paying for a good article or a gold brick. This is just what these officials were seeking to do and just what the Headlight upheld them in doing and just what would have been done had it not been for the timely efforts of certain citizens who, backed by an overwhelming public sentiment demanded an investigation. This investigation may or may not establish that the Warren Construction Co. has failed to live up to its contract with the city but that the investigation should have been made and is fully warranted and justifiable no man of sense can deny.

The Headlight attacks the motives of some of those who have been prominent in the investigation by charging them with malice and personal spleen. No such motives exist. The people who are at the head of the movement are active business men, who are spending liberally of their time and means and are rendering an invaluable service to the community and I believe have the moral support of all right thinking people.

Irrespective of the result of this investigation it is clear to any person capable of reasoning that this city and its property owners have been subjected to the rankest kind of imposition. This little city, with little more than one fifth the population of Corvallis, has, when Fifth Street is finished, the same number of miles of pavement that city has. It is said we have as many miles of pavement as Forest Grove and Hillsboro combined, which cities have a combined population of 3788.

If Tillamook's growth is no more rapid in the future than in the past many poor people cannot financially survive this foolishly extravagant and their property will be confiscated.

The most important duty of a newspaper is to protect the community from such conditions as we have described but the Headlight has maintained absolute silence, further than to make dirty, cowardly insinuations against those who have honestly striven to protect themselves and their neighbors from injustices. Why has it done so? We understand it was about to speak at one time but for some unknown reason changed its mind and has been a real good dog ever since.

Mr. Baker, you belong to a class of loud mouthed shallow fellows in this community who never have contrituted appreciably to any substantial advancement that has been made in this county. You and they do not possess the mentality to discern between progression and retrogression. You think binding this city to pay between \$200,000.00, and \$300,000.00 with an assessed valuation of \$500,000,000; breaking up the green-sward in cow pastures and paving same; paving untraveled side streets; accepting miles of pavement without investigation; blindly binding your neighbors to pay sums as high as \$12,000.00 at a clatter, without protection excepting to fall back on a bond that you attempt to talk about, and know as little about the man who furnished you the dope; crying down your neighbors who are stung into the thousands and are attempting to do investigating work that is the plain duty of the council to have done is progression. It is retrogression, Mr. Baker, pure and simple.

In justice to certain members of the old council, under whom the improvements in question were made, will say that they have acted fairly, co-operated with the citizens in their work of investigation and and we believe them above reproach.

Will add that the party whom the Headlight was evidently aiming at in its last issue as to signing the petition for improvements did so under a misapprehension of the true condition as they existed and was assured by a man in whom he reposed confidence that the cost of improvements would not exceed 50 per cent of what they really have cost and was misled as to the extent of the same.
