## New Industry For Tillamook County.

**Milk Sugar Factory Being Promoted. Dairymen to be Paid 7 Cents per Hundred Pounds for Whey.**

The former agitation in this county and in the vicinity of Tillamook City, by the National Milk Sugar Company, who worked this field during the past year, is now nearing the sure realization of past efforts. While the National people have withdrawn from this field entirely, as they have recently stated, there are at this time others interested in the enterprise who are meeting with great success in getting the dairymen to sign up on contracts for their whey.

### Seven Cents Offered.

While the National people only offered 5c per 100 lbs. for whey, and wanted a 15 year contract, the new promoters are contracting at 7c per 100 and only want a 10 year contract. The price offered and the contracts are very liberal, in the fact that in addition to the 7cent offer, the new people will take all hogs that the farmers may have, at the highest coast market price at the time their plants are ready for operation.

### Thirty Million Pounds of Whey.

There is estimated to be produced for the year 1913, over 30,000,000 pounds of whey in the Tillamook valley, the price of 7c or at \$1.40 per ton will give the dairymen a clear profit on the whey that is now being wasted to a great extent with a small portion fed to hogs, of approximately \$2,000,000; and in addition to the money received from the product there is also the large item of labor and operating expense involved in manufacturing the sugar.

### Three Factories and Refinery Planned.

To handle the product, it has been stated there will be three crude sugar plants and also a large refinery for refining the sugar ready for market. It is stated that one plant will be operated in the vicinity of Maple Leaf Factory, the whey from the Clover Leaf factory at Kelebis river, being hauled to this plant. Another plant will be established near the Fairview factory and the whey will be hauled from the Red Clover to this plant; while the Long Prairie and the South Prairie product would be hauled to the plant erected near the Tillamook Factory. The refinery plant will be established where rail and water transportation is of easy access.

Mr. Wm. J. Warner, an experienced chemist, is now taking up the matter with the dairymen in this valley, and every support should be given this gentleman by our dairymen. This industry means a great deal for all directly concerned. By the establishment of this industry, it will take the dirtiest animal of the ranch, and give a better income for the whey than you could possibly get out of your hogs. It is stated that the new promoters have ample funds of their own and are not asking the people of this valley to dig up any bonus or subscription of stock. If they can get sufficient raw material to make their venture into this field assure them a very small profit on the capital invested they will come with their money and build their plants in Tillamook. Do all you can in your way to help toward the success of this enterprise.

## TILLAMOOK VETERANS WILL ATTEND GETTYSBERG ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION.

C. N. Drew and Chas. Reynolds of this city, war veterans and participants in the battle of Gettysberg, have applied for the privilege of attending, with other veterans of that battle, the fiftieth anniversary celebration of that noted conflict. The celebration will be in the nature of a reunion which will be held from June 29th to July 6th of this year. Our state legislature appropriated at its last session \$5,000 with which to pay the transportation of fifty of the veterans, it being the impression at the time the appropriation was made that not more than fifty veterans would care to go. It has been found since, however, that a hundred or more are desirous of making the trip.

The state of Pennsylvania will furnish food and lodging for the old soldiers from the 29th of June until the 6th of July.

Mr. Drew received word from his old regiment back in Maine that if Oregon would not pay his expenses Maine would.

Chas. Reynolds is very anxious to make the trip. He says that there was a day when he did not care very much about being at or near Gettysberg, but he would like very much to be there at the coming reunion.

The old soldiers will camp on the grounds and preparations will be made to feed them there in army style.

Every veteran of the battle of Gettysberg should be permitted to make the trip free of cost of transportation, at least, if they are physically able to make the trip, and if the state has not provided sufficient funds, enough private subscriptions should be secured very easily with which to pay the additional expense.

## A TILLAMOOK COUNTY PIONEER PASSES AWAY.

On Thursday of last week Peter Jenek a much respected pioneer of Tillamook County and a well to do rancher of the Nestucca Valley, passed away at the home of his brother-in-law Frank Berns of Tillamook.

Mr. Jenek had been ill since last August, but was taken seriously ill about a month ago with a weak heart and other complications and was brought to Tillamook that he might receive every care and comfort.

The funeral services were held from the Catholic church of this city, Rev. Father Van Clarenbeck officiating.

Peter Jenek was born in Elases, France, Oct 13, 1844. He came to America in 1871, and settled at Springfield, Ill., where he was married to Madgaline Berns in 1875. In March 1888 they came to Oregon and settled on a homestead in the Nestucca Valley.

Eight children were born to this union, two girls and six boys, the girls and one son having died. He is survived by a loving wife and five sons, Martin, John, Peter, Tony and Joseph. Deceased served in the French army for seven years and fought in the Franco-Prussian war of 1870-71.

## Commercial Club Elects Officers.

**Committee Appointed to Look After Important Business. Club to Boost State Dairy Meeting.**

On Monday evening the Tillamook Commercial Club met in regular session with President Shrode in the chair.

On motion a committee was appointed to negotiate for the rental for another year, of present club quarters or possibly new quarters. R. W. Watson, Will Spalding and Dr. Kerron were placed on this committee.

On motion a committee was appointed to prepare an exhibit of Tillamook County products for display at Los Angeles, Cal., said display to be conducted under the auspices of the Sunset magazine and the S. P. Ry. It is said that at least 10,000 people view daily the displays that are cared for at the Los Angeles depot by the S. P. Company. Chas. Kunze, E. J. Claussen, Wm. G. Tait, E. T. Haltom, F. C. Baker and C. E. Trombley were placed on this committee.

Chas. Kunze was called upon to make some remarks and he responded by giving a talk upon the proposed demonstration farm for Tillamook County. It was Mr. Kunze's opinion that a demonstration farm would aid in doubling the present output of our dairy ranches. Mr. Kunze is very much in favor of advancement all along the line, and he believes there should be a strong steady pull by all interests for the demonstration farm. Geo. Williams, one of our prominent ranchers, made a few remarks endorsing Mr. Kunze's statements.

Judge Galloway, who was present, was called upon for a talk and responded, giving a very interesting talk the gist of which was to the effect that we should get our house in order and prepare for the opening of the Panama Canal. It is his belief that the Pacific coast will see and enjoy a greater advancement during the next five years, than we have experienced during the past twenty-five years.
