NEHALEM NEWS

From Enterprise

Charles Hawke, accompanied by Editor Collins, came up from Bay City Saturday to hold an inquest over the body of a sailor of the ill-fated ship, which was found on the beach last Friday. After the inquest, the body was buried in the local cemetery in view of which already contained the body of the sailor taken from the wreck by the life savers.

The Nehalem Valley Meat Co. is to have a wholesale establishment at Nehalem to enable them to ship out beef to the various camps and towns along the P. H. & N. The fact that a great deal of the shipping which is done by them by rail, has caused them to build to Nehalem. The retail market will still remain at Nehalem City, with a possibility of another being opened at Wheeler in the near future.

F. A. Rowe returned from Portland yesterday where he had gone to arrange for a dredger being sent to the Nehalem river for the clearing out of the channel between Todd's point and Wheeler. He was unable to secure the dredger at Tillamook Bay as there is about six week's work to be done at that place before their appropriation is exhausted, and until that is done the departmental rules prohibit the transportation of any equipment to another field. It is thought, however, that the port of Nehalem Commission will be able to secure a dredger now at a southern port when it is transferred to the Columbia. Negotiations are now under way to have it sent here for a few months, before being taken to its ultimate destination.

Captain Westphal of the ill-fated Mimi, accompanied by an attorney from Portland, came in Tuesday to ar-

range the local affairs in connection with the recent attempt to float the Mimi. He was also accompanied by one of the sailor boys who survived the wreck and who has been given permission to remain in this country by the immigration authorities at Portland. The first and second mates have already returned to Germany, while the third mate intends to make the United States his adopted land. Captain Westphal will return to Germany upon completing all arrangements in connection with the Mimi disaster.

Mr. P. B. Humke has begun operating his Planing Mill at Nehalem during the past week and reports everything running in splendid order. Having operations on the Neakama, he is now busy under way with two magnificent cottages and one-rooming house under construction at the present place. It is reported that in the near future these cottages are to be constructed simultaneously, which will no doubt keep the planing mill running to its full capacity for some time. We are informed that a fireplace was built in one of the new cottages, requiring approximately 50,000 pounds of stone in its completion. It is a commendable fact in the promoter of the above resort, that all the buildings erected on the premises are carefully and substantially constructed with a view of making the whole one of the most beautiful resorts on the Pacific coast.

NOTICE OF PETITION FOR INCORPORATION OF THE CITY OF WHEELER.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Notice is hereby given, that on Wednesday, the 7th day of May, 1913, at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. at the May term of the County Court of the State of Oregon for Tillamook County, a petition will be presented to said County Court praying for the incorporation of the City of Wheeler, in Tillamook County, Oregon; that said petition, in words and figures as follows, to-wit: In the Honorable County Court of Tillamook County, State of Oregon. We, the undersigned, qualified electors of Tillamook County, State of Oregon, and residents within the following described limits and boundaries in said County, to-wit:

People in the News

W. J. Harris, formerly Democratic chairman of Georgia, has been named by President Wilson to be director of the census, to succeed E. Dana Durand.

Samuel Gampers, president of the American Federation of Labor, is confined in a hospital at Washington, threatened with mastectomy of the left arm. He has been ill for several weeks.

The strike at Paterson, N. J. developed a new phase with the arrest of Joseph Fisher, a silk manufacturer, on the charge by Grace Passino, a striker, that he threatened her with a revolver. Miss Passino was picketing.

Arizona has practically removed the pardoning power of the chief executive. Governor Hunt of Arizona has vetoed the revised penal code of that state as embodied in a bill passed by the legislature after several weeks.

As a result of appointment of Miss Florence E. Corbett of New York city, as manager of the Princeton university dining halls, women will have charge of the feeding of 600 members of the freshman and sophomore classes next year for the first time in the history of the institution.

Miss Olga Tenoshovich, of St. Petersburg, Russia, committed suicide in her room in a fashionable hotel in San Francisco by shooting herself in the mouth with a revolver. Miss Tenoshovich, who is said to be the daughter of a Russian countess, was the fiancée of Isaac Upham, a wealthy printer.

Dr. Edward S. Higley of Chicago, who had no particular idea that he was casting broad upon the waters, in the early '80's, lent Charles Froelich \$100 to assist him through a course at the University of Nebraska. Dr. Higley has just received word that Froelich had died in Australia, leaving his benefactor a fortune of \$1,000,000.

Bryan and Clark Get Together

Washington.—William J. Bryan and Champ Clark, who have been openly hostile since the Baltimore convention which nominated President Wilson and defeated Clark, have buried the hatchet. The two met at a luncheon with a Washington editor and formally wiped out the past. Both issued statements expressing good will.

Bigamy and Theft Woman's Charges

Portland.—Joseph E. Ellis, whose aliases are, according to county officers, Rev. E. L. Richards and C. H. Duffy, was taken from the California Limited at Dunsmuir, Cal., by local officers, acting under instructions sent by Sheriff Word. His wife, two daughters and a son were also taken from the train. Sheriff Word sent a deputy to bring the family back to Portland, where Ellis, or Duffy, may be charged with bigamy and swindling a woman whom he recently married in Georgia, out of \$2650.
