Monday, May 20th, is the date set for a mass meeting to be held at the Court House, in the interest of a county fair. A large attendance is desired. The meeting is called for 10 o'clock, sharp. Let everybody attend.

The Masonic Building Association has borrowed \$10,000 which will be added to another \$5,000 subscribed by local people, for the construction of a \$20,000 structure on the corner of First Ave. East and Second Street. This building will be a fine addition to the city. The work of such organizations as the Mt. Fellow and Masons in financing the erection of splendid buildings is of much benefit to the city and should be greatly encouraged.

There is considerable complaint because of the fact that our streets are so dusty. It was thought that when our streets were paved the dust nuisance would be eliminated, but it seems that we were mistaken. It costs considerable to keep four miles of pavement clean, which fact was evidently not thoroughly considered by the council when the contract was let. From the looks of things it seems that the business men may be put to the extra expense of keeping the streets sprinkled or cleaned.

The Tillamook Band boys have again organized for the summer and have engaged Lyle Lewis of Portland as instructor. Mr. Lewis is a competent and comes well recommended. Tillamook City should have a band and we are sure our people will loyally support one if the boys get together and show the proper spirit. A good band is a fine thing for a town and it is to be hoped that Mr. Lewis will succeed in getting the boys interested to such an extent that they will make good. We understand that Mr. Lewis is desirous of organizing a class of a dozen or more beginners, to work into the band organization as soon as they show the necessary ability.

Brother Baker still continues his lament because of the fact that the Underwood Tariff bill contemplates removing the duty on milk and cream, while retaining a duty of practically three cents per pound on butter and cheese. The lowering of the tariff on milk and cream no doubt springs from the demand of the large cities in the East which are hard pressed for such necessities and are near enough to the Canadian line to be able to avail themselves of Canadian milk and cream. Bro. Baker evidently has not thought of the starving babies of the large Eastern cities. Politically he has never advocated anything but the cause of the interests, therefore it is quite natural in this case that he should not think of the underdog. There is another phase to the question, however, and that is to the effect that when the Democrats considered the lowering of the tariff on milk they no doubt had in mind the thousands of disgruntled political pap sucking republicans who are playing the baby act, and who, by their attitude, are expected to at once take to the sucking bottle in real baby style. We understand that both milk and sucking bottles are to be placed on the free list. The Democratic administration is proving itself far sighted indeed, considering even the babies, which fact should be very consoling to Bro. Baker.
